Ration Dates and Data

RATION BOOK NO. 2

MAY 9—Red stamp G (meats-fats) in book No. 2 valid; stamp H valid May 16; J valid May 23. All, including under E and F stamps valid through May 31. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

MAY 31—Blue stamps G, H and J valid through May 31.

MAY 31—Retailers must register with local boards and receive allowable inventories of meats and fats.

SUGAR

MAY 31—Stamp No. 12, book No. 1, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

COFFEE

MAY 30—Stamp No. 23, book No. 1, good for 1 pound, valid through May 30.

SHOES

JUNE 15—Stamp No. 17, book No. 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Stamps are interchangeable with in the family.

GASOLINE

MAY 21—No. 5 stamps, in A book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

FUEL OIL

SEPTEMBER 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

TIRES

MAY 31—Cars with C books must have tires inspected by this date; B books by June 30. First inspection for A bookholders must have been made by March 31; subsequent inspections within every six-month period thereafter, but at least 90 days apart. September 30 next tire inspection deadline for A books.

Federal Grading Of Eggs Modified

Some modifications of federal grades for eggs sold through retail channels have been made by the OPA in placing permanent price ceilings on market eggs, an explanation of which has just been received by County Agent J. Roland Parker from Noel L. Benlon, extension poultryman at Oregon State college.

Grades provided for eggs sold at retail are AA, A, B, C, or as sorted eggs. Assorted eggs are those which are edible but ungraded and which have a net weight of not less than 43 pounds per case and contain not more than 20 per cent of dirty and un-checked eggs. These are required to be marketed as sorted or ungraded eggs and sold at grade C prices.

All eggs sold through retail channels with the exception of AA grade may be graded by the producer, wholesaler, or retailer in compliance with new U. S. consumer standards, while any eggs sold as AA must have been inspected by a licensed federal inspector. All must be plainly marked as to grade and size.

The five sizes provided for under the OPA classification are jumbo, extra large, large, medium, and small. The minimum net weights per dozen of these are, respectively, 28 ounces, 26 ounces, 24 ounces, 21 ounces, and 18 ounces. Some variations of individual eggs is allowed within these total weights. Thus, for the different grades individual eggs may be included which by the dozen would weigh not less than 27, 25, 23, 20, and 15 ounces.
