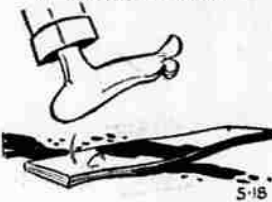

It isn't very often that I find it necessary to write a column for Mr. Wellman's "Feed Bag," and even now he could probably do the job necessary just as well or perhaps better, but Glen is busier than a one-armed paper hanger so I am going to try and relieve him a little bit.

First of all, I desire to thank the customers for their patronage and patience during the past year. I fully realize that it is inconvenient when you are unable to get a sack or a truck load of feed when you want it, and for this I apologize, but wish to add that so long as the war continues, and even perhaps afterwards, this condition will not get any better and is very likely to grow steadily worse. Operating this institution as we have had to do during the past year has been anything but pleasant, and in addition it has been rather an expensive business in more ways than one. Customers have lost their temper and gone elsewhere to trade. Others have just given up a good round cussing and let it go. Still others can not understand why and seem to believe that it is something we could help if we tried. For the past 22 years we have been manufacturing mixed feeds under the Umpqua Brand and have served many of you constantly during that period of time, and believe me we have tried to give you good service and good feed constantly.

Now, I am going to tell forth a few reasons why things are not like they used to be and ask you to remember that regardless of the fact whether you and I make one dime on our operations, to bear in mind the fact that there is a war and is likely to be a war for several years to come, and that you and I are not producing food for a personal gain half so much as for the purpose of ridding the world of rats. And I think you will agree that it is up to each and every one of us, regardless of what we are doing, to hit the nail and keep hitting it for our own salvation, regardless of profit. The Department of Agriculture informs us that there is a shortage of protein concentrates in the United States amounting to one million nine hundred thousand tons with the situation steadily growing worse. The feed manufacturers of the United States have been asked to cooperate on a Protein Conservation program as prescribed by the Department of Agriculture. In other words they believe in the plan of reducing the protein content of all feeds, and at the end of this year having some concentrates available for ready use rather than to continue with our high protein feeds and having the nation run out also.

Now another serious item that may cause inconvenience as it does us, is the machinery problem. Machinery of all kinds, regardless of how strong or good, will break, and if it does under the present circumstances, we may or we may not be able to get new parts or repairs quickly. Many times this has happened and the customers knew nothing about it, but now a breakdown may mean a wait for parts for as long as six weeks. This condition is no different in our mill than it is in any other mill. We have a good reserve stock of most parts, but even so feed may be temporarily short simply due to breakdowns.

Still another item that may cause temporary delay is that of transportation. All of you realize, or should, the tremendous load thrown upon our railroads by ship construction, troop movements, etc. Often have had to wait sometimes five and six times the normal length of time for supplies to reach us with which to make your feeds. We have tried to overcome this by ordering larger quantities farther ahead, and in a measure we have been quite successful, but there have been times when we had nothing with which to
