Veal Wholesalers Pay Fines for Overcharges

PORTLAND, May 19.—(AP)—Three local veal wholesalers felt the wrath of the OPA yesterday as treble-damage actions were pressed.

The Vic & Phil Produce company paid thrice the amount of an overcharge made in April. The fine was \$6.95. A. A. Welch & Co. was fined \$38.45 for April overcharges. Frank Metzger of the Moore Produce company was fined \$13, double the amount of an overcharge. He testified he had unintentionally included a freight charge in the bill.

Roberts to be Returned For Larceny Penalty

Meredith Roberts, held under arrest at Kelso, Wash., is to be returned to Roseburg for sentence in the circuit court on a charge of larceny, Sheriff Bud Carter reported today. Roberts pleaded guilty to the charge several months ago but sentence was set aside conditional upon his entering military service. As the terms were not complied with, he is to be returned for sentence, under an order issued by Judge Carl E. Wimberly.
