Three Poisons Available For Flea Beetle Kayo

Potato growers in regions infested by flea beetles are assured of adequate protection for their crops this year, either through use of the standard rotenone treatment or by using calcium arsenate or cryolite, according to entomologists at the Oregon experiment station. Regular garden crops can be protected the same way.

Use of rotenone in potato flea beetle control has just been permitted after earlier regulations had restricted its use to other crops. Increased importations of rotenone-bearing roots, even though at higher prices than formerly, have been relieving the situation considerably, according to word received at the college.

Buck Rakes Made From Trucks Found Practical

A mechanic in Burns has been so successful in transforming old trucks no longer usable for highway work into buck rakes for hay purposes that the extension service at O. S. C. has just issued construction plans and descriptions of such a rake modeled largely after one owned by Jenkins Brothers at Diamond, Oregon.

In reconstructing a truck into a buck rake, the cab is removed and the steering mechanism is changed so that the driver sits facing the drive wheels in the rear, on which the rake itself is mounted. Copies of the circular containing construction plans are available at county extension offices.

Ex-Treasurer Of Myrtle Creek Begins Jail Term

Ray Reynolds, former city treasurer of Myrtle Creek, who was sentenced here in Nov. 1942, to one year in the state penitentiary and a term in the county jail, on a charge of larceny of public funds, voluntarily surrendered to Sheriff Bud Carter today to begin his jail sentence. At the order of Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly, he is to serve out a fine of \$16,000.72 at the rate of \$100 per day.

Reynolds was recently released from the state penitentiary following the completion of his one-year sentence, receiving time off for good behavior. Application for conditional pardon was denied by Governor Snell, and upon receipt of such information, Reynolds voluntarily appeared to begin his service in jail.

He was accused of misappropriating city funds entrusted to his care.

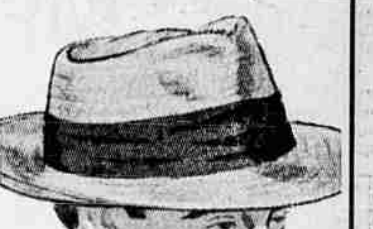
