

Jack Kidder to be West Point 'Grad,' Aunts to Attend

Mrs. James E. Sawyers and her sister, Gertrude Rast, will leave tonight for West Point, New York, where they will attend the military academy graduation ceremonies June 1, at which time their nephew, Jack Kidder, will be graduated and commissioned as a second lieutenant of infantry.

Kidder, who is graduating with the wartime class which has crowded four years of studies into three years, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley L. Kidder, now prisoners of war in Manila. He attended the local elementary schools and accompanied his parents to the Philippine islands, where he was graduated from high school. He applied for appointment to West Point, and while awaiting an opportunity to enter the academy returned to the United States and served one year with the regular army, getting training in mechanized forces under General Patton, and participating in the pre-war maneuvers in Louisiana.

He was appointed to the academy by Senator McNary. A class-

mate is the son of General "Hap" Arnold, commander of the U. S. air forces.

The West Point graduation class will include W. E. Naylor, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Naylor of Bend. The senior Mr. Naylor formerly taught school in Roseburg and Mrs. Naylor, the former Beth McElhinny, is a sister of Mrs. L. L. Spencer of Roseburg. Cadet Naylor will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the army air forces and has received assignment to bomber pilot special school at Nashville, Tenn., for nine weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor are now on their way to West Point, planning to stop en route to visit relatives in Minnesota.

Time Limit Urged on Long Distance Phoning

Elimination of unessential long-distance communication is urged by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, which is asking the cooperation of local telephone users, according to W. M. McEachern, manager of the Roseburg office. It is particularly requested, he states, that long distance conversations be limited to a maximum of five minutes. The purpose is to speed traffic over congested routes, especially during hours when demand is heaviest. During such periods of peak load, the long distance operator will make the following request of telephone users: "Please limit your call to five minutes—others are waiting." The operator is instructed by the company to make this request and cooperation of patrons is requested, McEachern said.

RAF Hits New Blows At Germany and Italy

Moeche and Eder dams Sunday night.

The great Tirso dam, which may have been an allied target, is in central Sardinia on the largest artificial lake in Europe. Reuters said, describing it as about twice the size of the quarter-mile-long Eder dam.

The hydro-electric plant at Tirso dam was said to provide most of Sardinia's electric power. The lake was described as 13 1/2 miles long and three miles wide with a storage capacity of nearly 15,000,000,000 cubic feet of water.

It was not brought out whether the dam attacked was actually breached, nor were there details of the action.

Italy, Sardinia Hit

On the invasion-jittery southern flank of Hitler's Europe, U. S. Flying Fortresses delivered a fiery assault on the Italian air-drome at Grosseto, 90 miles north of Rome, and other allied planes attacked stepping-stone islands in the Mediterranean including Sardinia and Pantelleria.

Allied headquarters in North Africa announced that American bombers alone destroyed 113 axis planes yesterday in widespread sweeps marking "one of the greatest victory days in the history of the strategic air force."

With a loss of one allied plane, 91 enemy aircraft were destroyed on the ground and 22 in furious sky fighting. Seven of the victims were huge German transports, each capable in carrying 120 persons.

Toll of Planes Noted.

The RAF and the U. S. A. F. disclosed in a joint communique that they had destroyed 5,172 axis planes in air combats in the Mediterranean area between the entrance of Italy into the war on June 10, 1940, and the collapse of axis resistance in Tunisia this month.

Of these 3,415 were shot down by the middle east command squadrons, including Malta-based units, and 1,757 in the northwest African campaign.

Since the German and Italian ground forces tossed in the sponge, however, allied airmen have brought down 89 more planes, swelling the north African total to 1,846 and the list in all the Mediterranean area to 5,261. This figure does not include hundreds of enemy planes blasted on the ground.

strongly held than Attu was. No figures on enemy strength on the two islands have been given out officially, but estimates by competent authorities put the enemy force on Kiska at upwards of 10,000 men whereas there probably were only 2,000 to 3,500 on Attu.

NEW DELHI, May 21.—(AP)—United States bombers dropped more than 100 tons of bombs on Japanese supply lines and installations in central Burma yesterday, the third day in succession of such heavy raids, and three RAF formations maintained the pounding in other areas. It was announced today.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, May 21.—(AP)—Air forces of Japan and the allies are trading punches freely in the southwest Pacific after the manner of two wary boxers determined to keep the other off balance.

The Japanese stab consistently at allied supply bases on New Guinea. Allied planes strike daily at the air nerve centers from which the enemy's New Guinea raiders probably come.

This aerial parry and thrust have as a background this situation: the allies, in complete possession of New Guinea's Papuan peninsula, have moved up more than 100 miles to menace Japanese-held Salamaua.

In Oklahoma, Col. F. J. Wilson, U. S. army district engineer, said at Tulsa after a two-hour aerial tour of the flooded area: "This is the most water I ever saw anywhere except on the Mississippi."
