Appraisal Appeal Trial Continues

Circuit court continued the hearing today of the appeal of R. H. Wilson from damages awarded in connection with the application of John F. Hensley for a gateway road through the Wilson farm at Umpqua. The jury was completed Monday afternoon and the members of the panel went to Umpqua to view the property. Those drawn to hear the testimony were A. Larson, J. S. Marr, D. P. French, Joe Hutchinson, Margaret E. Savage, Dorothy Swatman, Adam J. Flurry, Grace Cloake, Pearl Healy, A. H. Roerner, Kathryn A. Petrequin, J. E. Hartle. The suit is one in which the county court ordered a gateway road through the Wilson place to afford an outlet for the plaintiff Hensley to the main road. The property taken from Wilson was appraised at approximately \$190. Wilson claims that the land was not properly valued by the road viewers and that he is entitled to a larger sum for the road right of way.

Ex-Nazi Prisoner Will Speak Here

Ivan Jacobsen, who spent many months in a German internment camp in Norway, will be in Roseburg Thursday, May 27, and address a public meeting at the junior high school at 8 p. m.

A representative of the Royal Norwegian Information services, Jacobsen has been loaned to the Oregon Civilian Defense council for a series of public appearances in which he will relate personal observations of Nazi rule in the conquered countries of Europe. Jacobsen was seized in Norway in 1940. He escaped after four months of solitary confinement, but returned voluntarily when reprisal was threatened against innocent Norwegians. He made a second escape attempt by deliberately breaking his arm causing his removal to a hospital, but while perfecting escape arrangements was exchanged by the Germans for a Nazi agent held by United States authorities.
