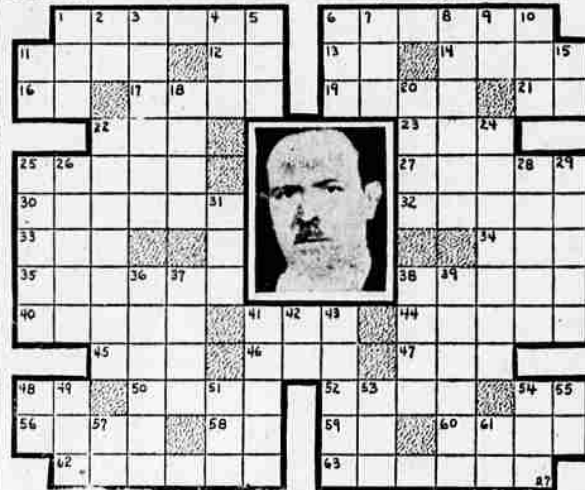

Farm WAR NEWS

MEAT SALES RULES

Reviewing the farmer's part in the government's program to manage the nation's war time food supplies, Leo Sparks, chairman of the County USDA War board, asks all county farmers to obtain slaughter permits before selling meat, collecting ration stamps for all rationed foods sold, observe meat grading requirements, charge within ceiling prices, and send collected ration stamps, with the report form, to the local War Price and Rationing board.

WAR SERVICE AWARDS

The 2411 Douglas county farm families who have signed 1943 farm plans for maximum war production will receive recognition in the form of a certificate of farm war service, signed by Secretary Claude Wickard.

PRESSURE COOKERS

Oregon will receive 3768 of the new victory model pressure cookers for rationing to home canners. The state USDA War board's pressure cooker committee is now working out allocations to counties.

DESTROY UNUSED RATION STAMPS

Destroying unused ration stamps that have expired is one way that farm families can assist in making the food management program effective. Unused stamps left over at the end of the month are valueless to consumers, but they're still good for retailers. If improperly used, these stamps could lead to illegal stockpiling and black market operations. While farm families are given as many points as city dwellers, the point system was set

up with the assumption that farm folks have less need to spend their ration points and probably will have some left over. If these unused stamps get into circulation, point values will have to be increased.

SIGN FOR INCENTIVE PAYMENTS

To qualify for incentive payments, Douglas county growers who are increasing acreage of potatoes or vegetable truck crops must sign an "intention to participate" in the incentive payment program before July 1, the county AAA committee advises. Forms are being mailed to growers whose farm plan indicates eligibility for incentive payments. Potato and fresh vegetable growers who do not receive this form are advised to contact the county AAA office.

Civilians Face Call to Join in Cannery Labor

WASHINGTON, May 26—(AP)—The socialite, the lawyer, the doctor and the teacher will be called on to take a turn working in the local cannery this year.

Unless "an extraordinary and efficient job" is done in recruiting new workers in the food canning and processing industry, the Office of War Information said today, some crops will go to waste and the supply of foods will become tighter.

For the most part, OWI reported, these newcomers will have to be members of the community who have never considered engaging in such work "and will do it as a war service, and for no other reason."

The War Manpower commission has estimated that 400,000 workers will be needed at the peak of this year's canning season, about the first of September.
