## Food Poisoning Strikes 100 Persons at Picnic

**OLYMPIA, Wash., May 28.**—(AP)—A laboratory report was awaited today on the source of apparent food poisoning which caused participants in a rural school picnic near here yesterday to "drop like flies on the school ground."

An estimated 100 persons out of approximately 145 at the McLane school's year-end celebration were stricken shortly after partaking of the picnic lunch. Fourteen were brought to an Olympia hospital for overnight confinement.

Dr. Reed Ingham said the ailment was some form of food poisoning, but declined to express an opinion as to the source.

## Simple Rites Set For Memorial Day

The Memorial day celebration will be curtailed to meet wartime standards, Ned Dixon, chairman, reported today. The usual parade and public mass meeting are being eliminated from this year's observance.

Simple ceremonies will be conducted Sunday morning, starting at 9:30 o'clock. The auxiliary to the United Spanish War veterans will conduct the ceremony for the sailor dead at the Veterans facility bridge. Instead of at the Oak street bridge. The local service men's organizations will unite in conducting the services for the soldier dead at the veterans' cemetery, immediately following the program at the bridge.

The veterans posts and auxiliaries will join at 4:30 p. m. Sunday in a Memorial program to be broadcast from Radio Station KRNL.

The day will be observed in all churches, in compliance with requests sent by the committee to all pastors urging Memorial day subjects at the morning worship period.

While the celebration falls on Sunday, the official celebration will be observed Monday. As Memorial day is a legal holiday in the state of Oregon, all banks, public offices, the public library, etc., will be closed Monday, as will all stores. The post office will take a half holiday. There will be no edition of the News-Review on that day.

## Baby Murder Case Nears Jury's Hands

**MEDFORD, Ore., May 28.**—(AP)—The first degree murder trial of Tillie Michalski, 22, Cleveland, was expected to go to the jury today.

The defense concluded its case late yesterday after close cross-examination of Sgt. Bernard Lotka, 23, who took the stand as a surprise rebuttal witness for the state.

The Camp White hospital technician testified that his 10-week-old son was dead when he returned to Miss Michalski's auto camp cabin here the night of April 1 after paying a storage charge on

her luggage at the bus depot. He maintained that she was crying and asked him not to question her.

Lotka was convicted of second degree murder in a separate trial last week and sentenced to life imprisonment. During his trial, the state offered in evidence statements purportedly made by him confessing that he smothered the illegitimate child.

"Just one more question before you go, Judge. What is this thing called propaganda you hear so much talk about these days?" "I'll give you an example, Hank. Last night I was reading an interesting little book called 'Hitler is in Favor'. It told how Hitler would very much like to see Americans fighting among themselves over prohibition because that would create disunity, waste the time of Congress and legislators in wet-dry arguments and cripple our war effort. It

also mentioned a booklet written about Hitler's government telling how Hitler's gang wants to maintain contact with foreign temperance organizations and how it contributes annually to an international temperance union. "You can bet Hitler isn't interested in seeing prohibition advanced in our country for any reason except that he knows it's a good way to stir up trouble. That's what they mean by propaganda, Hank."
