We who live in this present generation and even though the war is still being fiercely waged on a scale of battle fronts across the world, thinking people are looking forward to that day when the new world shall come into its own. Many an earnest Christian troubled, discouraged, disheartened, distraught by the chaos of the times, asks himself what would the Christ do if He were given a place at the Peace Table? We think He would be interested in democracy and the four freedoms, for "only the Golden Rule of Christ can bring the Golden Age of Man." That would be the first plank in His platform. That would be nothing new. Nineteen hundred years ago He said to His followers: "Do unto others as ye would that they should do unto you." That seems to be a hard lesson to learn.
