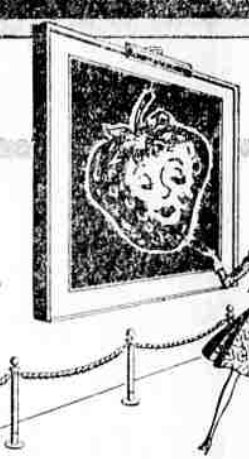

It's the berries!

In particular it's the strawberries right now that may be keeping a good many put-er-uppers guessing. "Shall I put up my strawberries as soon as possible?" "Should I wait?" "Will they be better later—and cheaper?" These are questions you alone will have to decide. Those who feel a "berry in the jam is worth two on the bush" will put up all they can at the earliest possible moment.

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES

4 lbs. berries 3 lbs. sugar

Pick over, wash, and hull the berries. Add the sugar to the strawberries, and heat gently until the sugar dissolves and the juice is drawn from the berries. Cook rapidly until the fruit is plump and transparent and the syrup thick. Pack carefully in clean, hot jars and seal. All berries except blackberries may be made into preserves by this method.
