Roseburg Senior High To Graduate 101; President Strand, O. S. C., to Speak

Roseburg senior high school will graduate 101 students at commencement exercises to be held at the high school auditorium June 4, starting at 8 p. m. The graduation scene will present a military appearance, for sprinkled among the capped and gowned seniors will be several boys who will be wearing uniforms of the military services. Seven members of the graduating class are now enrolled in the army, navy or marine corps, and several have been granted leave to attend the commencement program and receive their high school diplomas.

The commencement address is to be delivered by Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State College.

As a departure from usual procedure, the diplomas will be presented by F. L. Crittenden instead of by a member of the school board. Mr. Crittenden, former manager of the local telephone exchange, recently transferred to Astoria, has been invited to make the presentation because of the fact that he is a former classmate of Dr. Strand, the principal speaker. He is coming from Astoria to participate in the program.

The procession will be played by the senior high school orchestra. Special musical selections will be given by Mr. Leroy Hatt and the High School Glee club. The invocation and benediction will be pronounced by the Rev. H. P. Seonice.

The class includes 52 boys and 49 girls.
