If surrender of originals is not desired, reproductions will be made and the originals returned. Not wanted are maps issued by the U. S. government, National Geographic society, small-scale maps and world war I military maps. Franked labels will be sent so that material can be forwarded without expense of postage if request is made. Persons having maps should first write the service, describing in detail the material they have available.

Accused Pair Forfeits Bail on Spree Charge

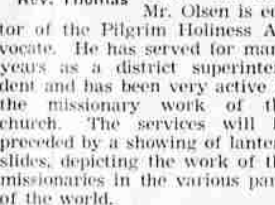
