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CHICKEN SAGE LOAF

- 6 cups diced day-old bread (12 oz.)
 - 1/2 cup chicken fat
 - 1 teaspoon finely chopped onion
 - 1/2 cup chopped celery
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon powdered sage
 - 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 - 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
 - 3 cups diced cooked chicken
 - 1/2 cup chicken stock (or 1 chicken bouillon cube in 1/2 cup boiling water)
 - 1 egg, beaten
- Prepare loaf by slicing and then cutting slices into dice. Melt chicken fat, add onion, and simmer until soft and yellow. Then add bread cubes and toss until fat is well distributed. Add celery, seasonings and chicken, and toss to mix thoroughly. Then add beaten egg and mix well. Turn into a 6-cup buttered casserole, set in a shallow pan of hot water, and bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) for 20 to 30 minutes, until nicely browned and firm. Serve hot with hot chicken gravy or mushroom gravy. Serves 6.
