DR. CHARLES A. EDWARDS

The present age is in far greater need of rest than the world was when the law of the Sabbath was made. A famous physician, Sir James Crichton Browne, said: "We doctors, in the treatment of nervous diseases, are now constantly compelled to prescribe periods of rest. Some periods are, I think only Sundays in arrears. The eminent conductor, Sir Landon Ronald, discontinued his Sunday concerts in 1928 on account of his health, saying: "I can no longer work seven days a week." Gladstone attributed his long life to his rigid observance of the Lord's Day. President Coolidge was asked: "Cannot I worship God in the green fields?" He replied: "You can, but you don't. When the father goes golfing Thomas takes a ride on his wheel. Mary plays tennis, and mother goes visiting friends, the day is anything but satisfactory. In the family pew where father and mother and children are found every Sunday, you will find the backbone of our national life. We are not poorer but richer, because we have through many ages rested from labour one day in seven. Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy, was not only for the children of Israel, but for all ages to rest both body and soul. Amen."
