Noted Episcopal Bishop Passes

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—Bishop James E. Freeman, 76, noted church leader and head of the Washington Episcopal diocese since 1923, died yesterday near the famous national cathedral he built.

A native of New York, Bishop Freeman worked in the accounting departments of several railroads for 5 years before he entered the ministry. Bishop Freeman raised most of the \$12,000,000 needed for the completion of the Washington cathedral, which he envisioned as a national shrine.
