SPINACH ONION RING

1 1/2 lbs. spinach
3/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 1/2 cups milk, scalded
1 bouillon cube
3 eggs, separated
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3 cups soft breadcrumbs

Wash spinach thoroughly, and trim off tough stems. Put into large saucepan, add 1 cup boiling water and 1/2 teaspoon salt, and boil until just tender, turning mass once as leaves wilt down. Meanwhile, melt butter or margarine, add onions, and saute until soft and yellow. Add hot milk in which the bouillon cube has been dissolved. Beat egg yolks and add salt, Worcestershire sauce and lemon juice. Combine with spinach and milk mixture, mixing thoroughly. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in. Pour into an oiled 6-cup ring mold which has been lined with waxed paper in the bottom. Place mold in a shallow pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 1 hour. Unmold onto warm platter and fill center of ring with creamed meat, vegetables or eggs, or serve with an egg or cheese sauce. Serves 5 to 6.
