Book No. 3, which is a replacement book, will be distributed by mail beginning late in June. Reverse side of the application card has spaces for additional family names. Cards are pre-addressed to OPA mail centers. Regular letter postage—two or three cents—is required. Cut this diagram out and use it to guide you in filling out your application card.

Here's how to fill out your Ration Book No. 3 application card in six easy steps. (1) Tear off this stub and keep it. (2) Read instructions carefully. (3) Type or print plainly. Your ration book will be mailed to the address you give. (4) Head of family fills in here. (5) List all for whom book No. 3 is sought. Note that head of family repeats his name on first line. If you need them, more spaces are on other side of card. (6) Applicant must sign here

Cut Living Costs Or Face Revolt, AFL Head Warns

WASHINGTON, June 11—(AP)—Predicting a "spontaneous revolt" of wage earners unless living costs are cut, President William Green of the American Federation of Labor told a senate committee today a \$2,000,000, 600 yearly subsidy is necessary to roll back living costs to levels of 13 months ago.

The only alternative, the AFL chief said, is to increase the 15 per cent "little steel" formula controlling wage increases "per cent for per cent of our failure to cut the cost of living down to the May, 1942, level."

"The workers of the nation feel that their government has gone back on its promise to extend them equality of treatment in the cost of living control," said Green.

"Unless immediate and express action is taken to carry out the policy pledged and promised to the wage earners of the nation, a widespread protest and spontaneous revolt on the part of the workers against the rising cost of living is inevitable."

Earlier members of the senate banking committee before which Green testified, said they favored legislation restricting sharply the amount and number of subsidies that could be paid to compensate for price cuts.

SEATTLE, June 11—(AP)—Farmers generally are discouraged over federal farm price policies, R. D. Flaherty, secretary of both the Washington State Farm bureau and the Washington-Idaho Wheat league, asserted yesterday.

He released the text of a telegram he had sent to Washington, D. C., to be delivered to Washington and Idaho members of congress, urging opposition to subsidies and price rollback.

The telegram said the farmers to whom he had talked in Washington and northern Idaho have expressed the opinion, without exception, that "continual discussion of subsidies and price rollback will seriously affect livestock marketing and dairy and other farm production. Farmers are aroused, especially after the great inflationary concessions made striking coal miners."

"I can't think of anything else you'll need for your Victory garden, Judge...you've got pretty nearly everything."

"I think so, too, John. Ever get your asparagus patch going?"

"I gave that up last year, Judge. Tried it six years in a row with no luck. Just haven't got the right soil, I guess?"

"Well, I think you're wise, John...no use keeping on trying things you know won't work. Just like prohibition. State-wide prohibition has been tried in this country

seventy-two times in the last ninety years. It has been adopted forty-seven times in the past thirty-three years and discarded everywhere except in three states. Same thing was tried in eight provinces in Canada and in Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia but it was an admitted failure and universally abandoned.

"The reason is prohibition does not prohibit. All you get is bootleg liquor instead of legal liquor, plus no end of crime and corruption."
