HARRISBURG, Pa.—St. Francis church was the scene yesterday morning of the marriage of Miss Joanne Yost, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter F. Yost, 1800 State street, and Lt. Lynn A. Creason, son of Mrs. John Park of Portland, Ore.

The Rev. John A. Maguire performed the ceremony and the bride was given in marriage by her father.

A model of white mousseline de soie fashioned with heart-shaped neckline, long sleeves and a tiered ruffled skirt, ending in a train, was chosen by the bride for her wedding. She wore a long veil which fell from a Juliet cap and she carried a Colonial arrangement of white orchids and sweetpeas.

Miss Ann Handley, cousin of the bride, who attended her as maid of honor, wore a gown of dawn blue mousseline de soie with a matching headpiece and she had a Colonial bouquet of spring flowers. After a few months he applied for and received a transfer to the parachute troops and was sent to Fort Benning, Ga., for training. He was then assigned to the 456th Parachute Bn. at Fort Bragg, N. C. This battalion was the first parachute artillery and all equipment now used by other artillery was first tested and developed by the 456th.

While convalescing from an injury received in a jump the 456th left for foreign service without him. He was then assigned to 513 Parachute Int. Fort Benning, and was promoted from second to first lieutenant a few months ago.
