Motor Cars Must Display Federal Stamp by July 1

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12—J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, announces that the federal motor vehicle use tax stamps in the denomination of \$5 now on sale in all post offices in Oregon and in his office at Portland, will evidence payment of the tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1943, and must be purchased on or before that date. The use on the public highway of an automobile, truck, motorcycle, or bus makes it subject to the tax. The tax stamp is transferable with the motor vehicle. If the vehicle is in storage or out of use July 1, it will become subject to tax as of the month in which it is placed on the public highway.

Collector Maloney said that, to guard against loss or theft, it has been suggested that, when affixing the stamps, the vehicle owner should dampen the windshield rather than the adhesive side of the stamp. Another effective method is to brush clear varnish over the stamp after it has been affixed. These methods have been recommended to keep the stamp intact upon the windshield. As an additional precaution it is suggested that each motor vehicle owner make a record of the serial number which appears on the use tax stamp for his record in the event the stamp should become lost. In Oregon all stamps are required to be placed in the upper left-hand corner of the inside of the windshield.

All motor vehicle owners are cautioned that the law requiring the purchase of the stamps has not been changed or repealed, and failure to purchase and display the new use tax stamps on vehicles using the public highways after July 1, 1943, will subject the violators to severe penalties imposed by law.

The various post offices will sell the stamps over the counter for cash only, and no mail order business with respect thereto will be conducted by the post offices. When stamps are ordered from the Collector of Internal Revenue, Portland, payment may be sent by mail. As the stamps have a money value, an unrecapitulated check cannot be accepted in payment thereof.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
JUNE 13—Red stamps M valid; N, June 20. All, including K and L expire June 30. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

JUNE 7—Blue stamps G, H and J valid through this date. Blue stamps K, L and M good through July 7.

SUGAR
AUGUST 15—Stamp No. 13, book No. 1, good for five pounds, expires at midnight. Stamps No. 15 and No. 16 in war ration book one valid for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning.

COFFEE
JUNE 30—Stamp No. 24, book No. 1, good for one pound, expires at midnight.

SHOES
JUNE 15—Stamp No. 17, book No. 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Stamps are interchangeable with in the family.

GASOLINE
JULY 21—"A" book expires. No. 6 stamps in "A" books valid through this date.

FUEL OIL
SEPTEMBER 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

TIRES
Cars with B books must have tires inspected every 4 months; cars with C books every 3 months; cars with A books, every 6 months.
