Bellowing, barrel-built Maj.-Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner is the big boss of our Alaska-based offensive in the Aleutians. Alaska is one-fifth the size of the U. S., but it has more shoreline—every foot watched under Buckner's direction. He did a decade of fortifying in 18 months. Tough-looking, white-haired Kentucky-bred Buckner is a forceful officer who never dodges a decision. At 50, he

hikes, flies, climbs under the same discomforts as his soldiers, who fear and respect him. West Point '03, he's served on the Mexican border, in the Philippines, in World War I. He hunts whenever he gets time. Troopers point to the unscarred belt of a big Kodiak bear nailed up near his quarters and say "the general just rared back and belted an' the critter died of fright."

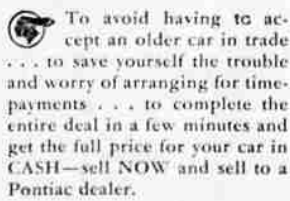

Food Price Rule Imperative, Says Administrator

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown told food industry representatives today that the OPA's new program of food price control "must work" if the nation is to avoid a major defeat on the home front.

"This defeat," he said, "will make difficult the winning of the war; it will make impossible the winning of the peace, for it will leave our economy shattered and helpless."

In a statement prepared for a conference of wholesale and retail food merchants, Brown called the price of foods the basic element in the budget of every family and added that unless food prices are effectively stabilized, "then the stabilization program as a whole must collapse."

Describing the general maximum price regulation as a "landmark in our fight to control inflation," Brown declared:

"Had it not been issued, the cost of living would have risen, not the ten per cent it has increased since May, 1942, but ten times ten per cent. For in the spring of 1942, the pressures upon the economy had grown to dimensions we had never before known, and we were confronted, not with the threat, but with the certainty of galloping inflation unless prompt and vigorous action were taken. In the general maximum regulation, we took prompt and vigorous action and stopped the sweep toward uncontrolled inflation."

Why Stabilizing Failed

Brown said failure to stabilize the cost of living was due to four reasons:

1. The tax and savings program failed to syphon off a sufficient proportion of excess purchasing power.
2. Because of lack of jurisdiction, the War Labor board was unable to stabilize wages before October 2, 1942.
3. Because of inadequate powers to control farm prices, costs to food processors continued to increase, forcing upward adjustment in their prices.
4. Because of inadequate use of subsidies which might have been employed to meet the pressure of rising costs, it was impossible to avoid upward adjustment of retail prices and the cost of living.

Next Tax Bill to Call For Sixteen Billion

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Congressional tax leaders said after a conference with Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau today that "every reasonable effort will be made" to enact a tax bill this year to meet President Roosevelt's request for an additional \$16,000,000,000 in revenues. Chairman Doughton of the house ways and means committee, who acted as spokesman, said the committee would hold discussions with a view of having hearings about two weeks before congress reconvenes if a summer recess is taken.

Doughton said no decision as to the amount or manner of taxation was reached at the conference, but he emphasized that the main provisions of any new tax bill will not become effective before January 1, 1944.

Roosevelt Urged to Appoint Food Czar

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Six members of the house agriculture committee laid before President Roosevelt today their demands for creation of a single head over all phases of the food program. But they left the White House apparently without having received much encouragement.

Chairman Fulmer (D., S. C.) said he had a feeling that "they want to continue with this experimenting and congress definitely doesn't want to do it and the people don't want to do it."

Meanwhile, in attributing a food shortage to "bungling price control methods," Albert S. Goss, master of the national grange, told the senate banking committee that a program of subsidy payments to roll back prices will cost "a great deal more than \$5,000,000,000."

Earthquake Jars Japan; No Damage, Tokyo Says

NEW YORK, June 15.—(AP)—Two main islands in the Japanese archipelago were shaken by an earthquake Sunday but "no damage was reported," a Tokyo broadcast of a Domei news agency dispatch said today.

The broadcast, intended for foreign consumption, said the shock was felt on Honshu, on which Tokyo is located, and on Hokkaido to the north.

A Rome broadcast, recorded by Reuters news agency in London, reported that very violent earth tremors believed to have originated in the Aleutian islands were registered by the Florence seismograph yesterday morning.

Truck Smashes Into Flock of Sheep; 68 Die

LAKEVIEW, Ore., June 15.—(AP)—A truck smashed into a flock of sheep on a highway near here, killing 68 head and injuring several others, an accident report showed today.

Austin B. Lewis, driver of the truck, said his vehicle rolled to the top of a rise and was gaining speed downhill when he sighted the flock in the road. Lewis said he jammed on his brakes but the brakelrod broke and he was unable to stop.

Walter Leehman, owner of the sheep, said 42 ewes, 23 lambs and 3 rams were killed. Lewis was uninjured and the truck was not damaged.
