Dr. Clyde T. Hockett, Native of Douglas, Dies

Funeral services were held at Enterprise, Oregon, today for Dr. Clyde T. Hockett, a native of Douglas county and nephew of J. H. Booth, president of the Douglas National bank of Roseburg, who died suddenly last Friday at his home in Enterprise.

Born in Douglas county, Feb. 2, 1878, he was a veteran of the Spanish-American and first world war. He resided for a number of years in the Roseburg and Garden Valley communities. He served in the state legislature from 1934 to 1942 as a representative from Walla Walla county. Surviving are his wife and three sons, Dr. Ashabel J. Hockett, New Orleans; Jay Hockett, a navy pharmacist; Ray Hockett, Enterprise, and a daughter, Mrs. Roger Debusk, Evanston, Ill.

Many of the regular school activities were hampered this year due to war time conditions. However, everyone had a most enjoyable time in spite of restrictions.

All of the girls from Douglas county stayed at the Kappa Alpha Theta house while the boys were divided up and housed at several different halls.

The girls were under the house management of Miss Eleanor Brunquist, assisted during the first week by Miss Helen Horner. The second week Mrs. Frances Horner took Miss Horner's place. The chaperons were Mrs. Clarence Bartlett and Mrs. Curtis Calkins. Everyone agreed that no finer leaders could be found on the campus.

Each house elected several officers. The presidents of the houses formed an executive council who, in turn, elected one boy and one girl as presidents for the whole summer school. Members of this council also acted as ushers during assemblies.

Kappa Alpha Theta's officers were: President, Pat Calkins; recreation chairman, Jean Turner; song leader, JoAnne DeBernardi, and etiquette chairman, Barbara Becker. The presidents of the executive council were Louise Franciscovich and Art Boling.

Busy Schedule Given

The summer school schedule is always full. Here is a brief idea of some of the ways the members spent their time.

In the morning the club members attended classes on numerous and varied subjects. Since the theme of this year's school was "Conservation and Production," most of the classes were of that nature. The boys' classes were of crops, livestock, forestry and poultry, while the girls had discussions ranging from lectures on personality development to flower arrangement and care and repair of electrical equipment as well as many types of crafts.

At the first afternoon assembly which was held after lunch, last year's president, Loraine Filiger, led the flag salute and club pledge before these duties were taken over by this year's president.

After the afternoon assembly and before dinner, the time was devoted to recreation. Among the sports available were swimming, pingpong, tennis, aerial darts, volleyball and soft ball. Or, if the club members were not interested in sports, they could attend educational moving pictures which were shown every afternoon, visit the museum or green houses or numerous other things.

The evenings were devoted to many different types of entertainment. The first two evenings, house meetings and election of officers were held. This program was made up entirely of summer school talent and was broadcast under the direction of Mr. Berton Hutten, manager of radio station KOAC, over which the program, which included some excellent numbers, was presented.

One of the saddest assemblies was the last one which was held Thursday afternoon. All of the awards which had been earned were presented at that time.

This was the last one because the farewell parties were held Thursday evening in place of an assembly. There were several parties but the main event of the evening and the one which was looked forward to all during summer school was the formal dance which was held in the Memorial union ballroom. Everyone returned home so happy to their homes to be housed on early the next morning to pack and leave for home.

A very familiar smiling face was missing around the campus during the greater part of this year's summer sessions. Mr. H. C. Seymour, state club leader, was ill at his home in Corvallis for several days and was not able to return to the campus until late in the second week.
