The fine of \$50 imposed in justice court this morning on Mrs. Mary Nilson, about 60, who pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk on a public highway, will hardly pay damages done to the county jail, Sheriff Bud Carter reported today. Hausotter, each of whom pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle without a driver's license.

PORTLAND, June 16—(AP)—Requiem mass was held here yesterday for Sister Mary Agatha, R. S. M., who died Sunday in a Portland hospital. Born in County Cork, Ireland, she came here 55 years ago and entered the Sisters of Mercy convent. She taught in Roseburg, Eugene and Portland parochial schools, retiring eight years ago. Two nieces in Ireland survive. Interment was in Mount Calvary cemetery.

SEATTLE, June 16—(AP)—The joy of motherhood was tempered with grief today for Mrs. Hilland Ulmer of Kirkland. She gave birth to a son, her second, last night only a few hours after Ulmer, 27, a shipyard worker and George (Bud) King, 18, Woodinville, drowned in a

freak boating accident on Lake Washington.

The two fell from an outboard cruiser yesterday afternoon and although good swimmers were unable to catch the boat as it circled about, aimlessly and unguided. Oliver Richardson, 24, also Kirkland, also fell in but supported himself with a pillow 20 minutes until a ferry arrived.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 16—(AP)—"Baby" is a hero today. The little dog is credited with waking his owners, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Avenell, after fire broke out in their kitchen yesterday.
