BREADCRUMB PANCAKES

1/2 cup shortening
2 tablespoons sugar
1 1/4 cups sifted dry bread crumbs
2 1/2 cups milk
1 cup all-purpose flour
2 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, separated

Melt shortening in a saucepan, and add the sugar and bread crumbs, stirring until well mixed. Then add 1 1/2 cups of the milk, and let stand until the mixture is thick. Meanwhile, mix the flour, baking powder, salt, and egg yolks, and add to the mixture. Beat the egg whites until stiff, and fold into the mixture. Stir in the crumbs and milk mixture. Finally, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake on a greased griddle, allowing moderately hot griddle, allowing 1/2 cup batter for each cake, and turning only once during baking. Makes 12 cakes 5 1/2 inches in diameter.



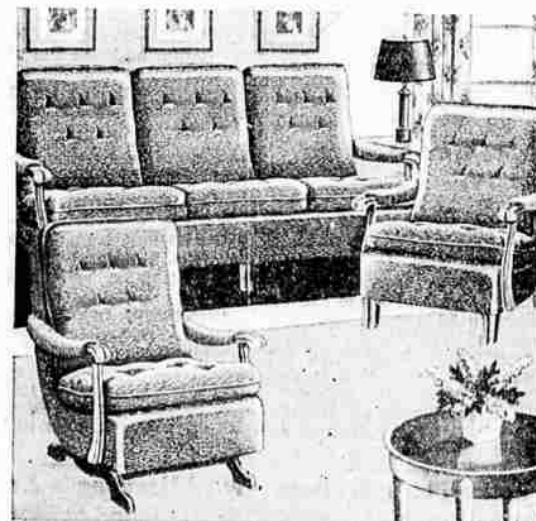

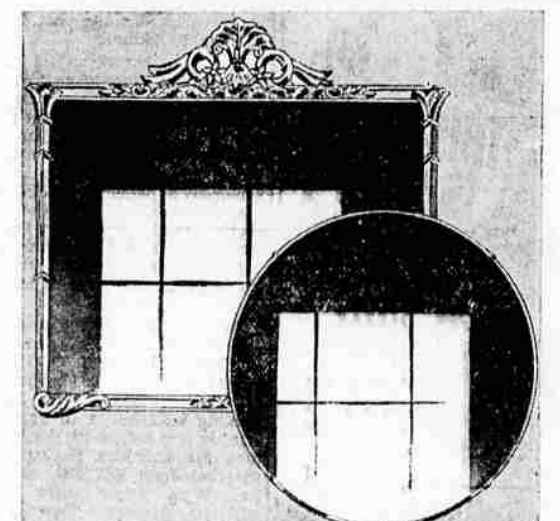

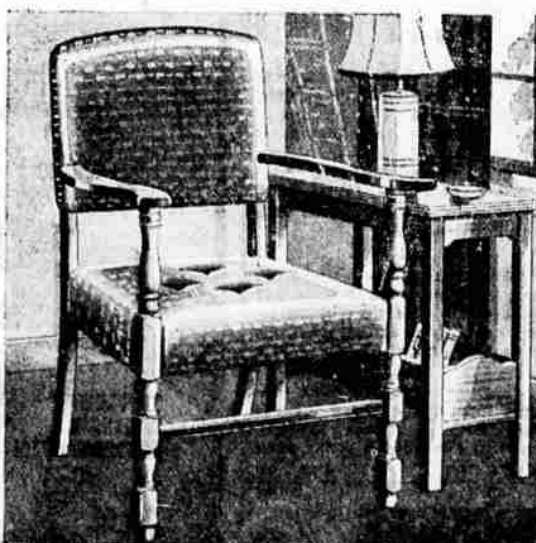
