World War I: Artillery teacher Fort Sill, Okla. Devised method to vastly increase accuracy.

1940: Made commander at Fort Bragg, N. C. Raised strength 13-fold and made Bragg the largest post in the nation, bigger than any German has. Boosted vast construction program.

5000 65,000

1941: Went to Fort Knox, Ky., as Armored Forces chief. Boosted armor from 4 to 14 divisions in 14 months.

May 1943: Takes over as commander of American forces in European war theater to key the final invasion battles.

On alert, good-humored Lieut.-Gen. Jacob L. Devers, new chief of American forces in the European war theater, weighs the staggering task of gearing the A. E. F. for invasion. He was master of his job before he got it, for tanks have been his bedfellows, artillery his voice, physical fitness his watchword. As Armored Forces chief, "Jackie" Devers himself picked out the land dread-

naughts and self-propelling artillery we're winning with. At 55 he's the youngest of his rank. A West Pointer '09, he served in Panama, in Hawaii, in France; he supervised building of the bases we got from Britain. This York, Pa., Dutch-Irishman is a hater of paper work, drives his staff officers from their desks to the field. He's five-ten, weighs 174, has mouse-colored hair.

In this time of the world's greatest war, every soldier of the cross should put on the whole spiritual armor and fight the good fight of sacrificial love and service for Christ and His cause. The only way to meet a "total war," is by "total preparation." The Christian soldier must have on his whole armor. A complete preparation within his heart, with his fellowmen, and with his God. "Christ liveth in me" is the only adequate inner preparation. "To love thy neighbor as thyself," and keep the Golden rule is our outer preparation. To keep the great commandment "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind," is total Godward preparation.
