DOUGLAS HEALTH UNIT RECEIVES CITATION AT STATE CONVENTION

Members of the Douglas County Health association, meeting Friday night at the home of the president, Mrs. Fred Fisher, were greatly pleased to learn that the Douglas unit had won a citation at the annual state convention of the Oregon Tuberculosis association. Douglas county was represented at the convention held at the auditorium of the Medical-Dental building at Portland on May 27-28 by the following delegates: Mrs. Arthur Marsh of Lookingglass; and Mrs. J. A. Maulding and Mrs. Paul Morgan of Roseburg, and with the two county health nurses, Mrs. Mary Barrett and Mrs. Hazel Lytle attending the joint sessions.

Mrs. J. A. Maulding very ably gave an inspiring report on the two day session which was presided over by Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, state secretary. The theme of the meeting being "Holding the Line".

Representatives from 26 out of 36 counties were present, all showing gains in years activities, especially in T. B. Christmas seal sales. Special noteworthy projects were chalked up on a large black board, Douglas county receiving notice for health talks given by Dr. E. J. Wainwright over KRNR.

Suggestions given for Health association programs included: motion picture projectors with several new films yearly; sponsoring of seal sales by town service clubs; examination of all school children before leaving school, for case findings; and placing of Health books in public libraries. Special stress was placed on the planning of a rehabilitation program and the need of regular checkup of former patients.

Thursday afternoon's session began with a talk by Dr. Herman E. Hilleboe, surgeon in charge of tuberculosis control, United Health Service. His topic was "The First Line of Action—The Community". He spoke of the urgent need of X-rays and chest examinations of all male wage earners since it was found that 47 per cent of the deaths from tuberculosis was in this group. He asked that special attention be given to workers in war industries, large mills, etc.

The discussion was continued by Miss Martha Shamberger who talked on Health Education. Dr. Harold M. Erickson, director of county health units, pointed out the need of legislation compelling T. B. patients who do not cooperate to have necessary treatment to prevent the spread of the disease to family and community.

The group of delegates met Friday morning at the armed forces induction center for a report of seal sales, Douglas county receiving a special award at this time.

Col. John J. Fulmer, commanding officer at the induction center gave a very interesting talk on world conditions and the war situation, also telling of the effort made at the center to help the boys entering the armed services. Delegates were then taken on a tour of the center by Lt. S. Tountz, who explained each step of the routine of induction.

Friday afternoon was held in joint session with the Oregon Health Officers' association. Mrs. Dunbar again presiding. Dr. Hilleboe addressed this meeting, his theme being Tuberculosis in Wartime. He gave interesting statistics on conditions in war-torn countries, stating that England had an increase of 13 per cent in tuberculosis, due to crowded living conditions, lack of hospitalization, non-pasteurization of milk, together with poor food. "This condition could be averted in this country," he said, "by control of persons within susceptible age limit and enforcement of food laws and regulations."

Mrs. Harriet Breneenstall spoke on communicable diseases and Mrs. C. L. Dunlap, president of Deschutes County Public Health association also addressed the group.

Mrs. Arthur Marsh reporting on the president's dinner, gave an interesting talk on needs and duties of an executive secretary and explained in detail the qualifications needed in this work.

Mrs. Maulding and Mrs. Morgan were appointed to assist with the educational program of the local association and Mrs. Wilbur Culp was appointed chairman of the Loan closet and will be assisted by Mrs. D. T. Myers.

Standard Oil Co. Explains Deal On Elk Hills Reserve

President H. D. Collier, of the Standard Oil company of California, today issued the following statement:

"Standard of California has been advised that for technical, legal reasons the contract between the Navy and Standard of California for development of the Elk Hills oil reserve has been declared by a representative of the department of justice to be invalid."

"This contract was proposed by the navy department and was designed to consolidate the area under navy control in the interest of conservation and to insure perpetuation of the area as a naval reserve in the public interest. As compensation, Standard of California was to operate the combined properties as a single unit in the navy's behalf and to secure its proportionate and legitimate compensation for its percentage of the total reserves out of production."

"The agreement, approved by the president, was based on authority contained in a congressional statute of 1938, which both the Navy department and Standard of California believed fully adequate to support the type of agreement ultimately concluded."

"It would appear from information so far available to this company that the sole question is one of interpretation of the law under which the Navy department and this company proceeded to negotiate. Fundamentally the agreement was fair to both parties, accomplished the Navy department's long desired objective, and was in the public interest."

"If the navy, in the light of the justice department's opinion, desires to terminate the contract, the company will of course continue to own and operate the lands in the Elk Hills pending further negotiations with the navy."

"This company desires to cooperate with the navy in every way possible in serving the best interests of our country."
