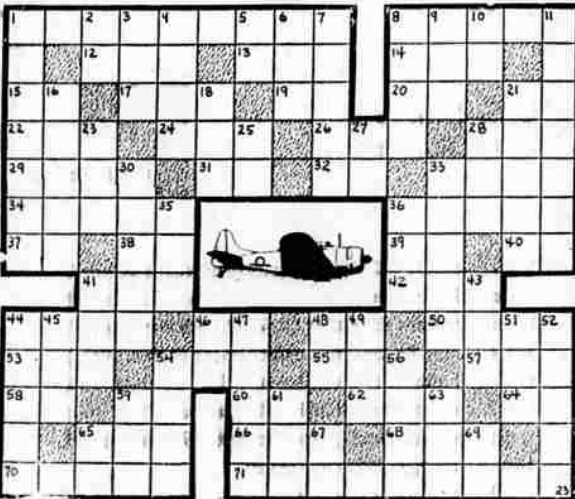

Daphne Hughes Takes New Duties In Chosen Field

Now Executive Secretary Of Youth Consultation Service in New Jersey

Miss Daphne Hughes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Washington Hughes of Roseburg, has accepted a position as executive secretary of the Youth Consultation Service of the Episcopal diocese of Newark, New Jersey. This agency was founded 25 years ago and offers case work service to young people between the ages of 16 and 25 years. It is supported by the Episcopal church, but serves young people of all Protestant denominations as well as those having no church affiliations. The service has been greatly increased by war conditions. Miss Hughes will assume her new duties Oct. 1.

The diocese embraces the six northern counties of New Jersey. A graduate of Roseburg high school, Miss Hughes attended the University of Oregon from which she was graduated with the class of 1931. She studied for one year at St. Margaret's School for Christian Service and in 1932 became student secretary at Northwestern university, Chicago, where she remained until 1935. She studied at Bryn Mawr from 1935 to 1939 and received her

professional certificates in case and group work. Since 1939 she has been engaged in consultation service with the Youth Consultation Service for the diocese of Newark, but has been on leave of absence since the first of the year while working on doctoral dissertation in the field of social case work at Bryn Mawr college. Miss Hughes holds a fellowship in the National Council on Religion in Higher education, in which she studied during 1942.

Preparation for Invasion Moving, Secy. Knox Says

WASHINGTON, June 22—(AP)—Navy Secretary Knox said today that preparations are moving "right along" for an allied invasion of Europe.

Knox was asked at a press conference for comment on a new Russian insistence that an allied army be thrown onto the German nominated continent. The Russians said that while the German army has been defeated several times during the past year and while the military situation is now generally favorable to the allies, there can be no victory without a second front.

Knox said he would make "no comment at all" on the subject of a "second front," a term that he has repeatedly avoided using. However, he said that preparations for an attack on Europe "are going forward right along."

"Obviously, we can't talk in specific terms," the navy secretary added, "but there has been no cessation of these activities." Knox holds and frequently has expressed the idea that there are many fronts in the war today and that it is erroneous to call a prospective front in Europe a "second front."

Japs' Hands off Russia. In response to other questions, Knox said he knew of no Japanese interference with the movement of supplies from the United States to Russia across the Pacific.

The line to Russia still is functioning, he declared, although "whether the Japanese are holding up any of the ships and examining them, I don't know." Asked specifically whether any of the ships had been taken by the Japanese as prizes of war, Knox said not to his knowledge. Nor did he know of any which had recently been sunk.

He recalled that "a long time ago," one or two of the vessels were lost, the Japanese at that time declaring they had been sunk by the United States to create an incident.

"Has anything developed on that route to Russia which would provide an international incident?" Knox was asked. "Nothing," he replied emphatically.

"Both sides are keeping very carefully away from anything that would precipitate an incident. The Russians are busy with the Germans on the west and Japan does not want to take on Russia."

Another questioner asked whether the Japanese base of Kiska island in the north Pacific now has been effectively blockaded. Knox replied that the Japanese probably could get in with submarines any time but agreed that a garrison the size of that at Kiska could hardly be maintained permanently by submarine-borne supplies alone. He added that the garrison would feel the pinch particularly in ammunition.

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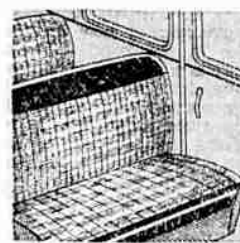
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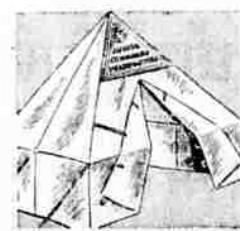
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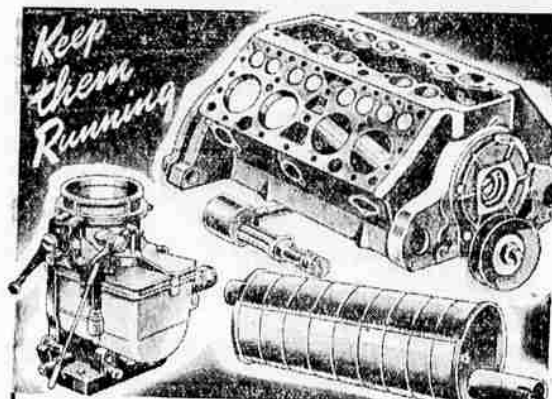
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
