Wage Boost For Cannery Workers Gets Official O. K.

SEATTLE, June 22—(AP)—The wage boost for employees of northwest canneries in accordance with a decision of April 28 by the regional War Labor board has been approved by the Director of Economic Stabilization Dr. George Bernard Noble, board chairman, announced last night.

The increase, effective immediately, will average 10 cents an hour for 60,000 cannery workers in Washington and Oregon, the announcement, made through the office of war information, said.

Dr. Noble said the action would:

Set basic pay for canneries of the Puget sound area, Portland and Vancouver, Wash., for men at 80 cents an hour and for women at 66 cents.

Set basic pay for the Walla Walla, Wenatchee-Yakima and Willamette valley areas at 77 cents for men and 63 cents for women.

Establish for the first time uniform wage schedules for cannery workers in the Portland and Seattle areas.

The order provides also that the 90 northwest canners who have petitioned the regional board for permission to make the pay increases may do so without waiting for OPA studies of the canners' demand for higher ceiling prices. Operators who have not requested permission for wage increases may receive immediate authorization on application to the regional board.

Youth Buys City Jail, Listed In Sale by Mistake

HARVARD, Neb., June 23—(AP)—Robert Pinkney, 16, clung steadfastly today to his claims of ownership of the municipal jail despite the action of the city council last night ignoring him completely.

The three-man council rescinded the appointment of the youth's father, Dr. C. E. Pinkney, as city physician. Dr. Pinkney is the only physician in this town of 700.

Officials wouldn't comment on the reason for removing him.

Robert, however, declared "I'm hopping mad. The meeting adjourned before I could even mention my ownership of the jail."

He had said prior to the meeting that he had assurance from Mayor Nels Torsteson that "some kind of settlement would be reached."

Robert paid six dollars for the building and four lots, one of which contained the jail, at a recent sale of municipal property. Mayor Torsteson said the jail was listed by error.

AFL of Oregon Raps Labor Board, Senator Holman

EUGENE, Ore., June 23—(AP)—Oregon Federation of Labor delegates pondered wartime problems today as the annual AFL convention entered its third day.

One resolution under consideration demanded that national headquarters set up a full-time staff of organizers in the state "for the final showdown with the CIO."

Because of expanding war industries the CIO actively has entered the organizational field recently in Oregon, long an AFL-dominated state.

Another proposal asked suspension or restriction of the National Labor Relations board for the duration. This one stemmed from the NLRB case against the AFL contracts with the Kaiser shipyards in the Portland area.

Another asked trials for enemy agents who engage in acts of brutality in violation of international law.

Still another resolution asked the defeat at the next general election of Sen. Rufus C. Holman. The resolution came just before the resolution deadline and was the only one of the day which brought cheers from the floor.

The resolution against Sen. Holman read "he has charged that all labor unions are rackets and that working people generally are shirking their jobs."

Liquor control commission employees should receive a salary raise, another resolution declared.
