

Newspaper Aid In Pulpwood Need Is Praised by Nelson

WASHINGTON, June 23—(AP)—Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production board today welcomed the assistance of a committee named by the American Newspaper Publishers association in the government-industry campaign to increase production of pulpwood for vital military and civilian war uses. He paid tribute to the "practical patriotism" of American newspapers.

The newspaper committee, headed by Walter M. Dear, publisher of the Jersey Journal, Jersey City, will seek to organize the daily and weekly press to assist in stimulating greater production of pulpwood in the four major producing areas—south, northeast, lake states and Pacific northwest—for essential war uses.

The committee will follow the general pattern of the newspaper unit scrap metal drive, but its application will be confined to areas where pulpwood is produced.

Nelson wrote Dear, president of the A. N. P. A. last fall when it sponsored the newspaper unit scrap metal drive, that this drive produced more than six million tons of vital scrap metal, 50 per cent more than asked for in the five weeks, and described the effort as "absolutely without precedent in this country."

"For the second time in an emergency situation involving production for the war effort, the American Newspaper Publishers association has offered its assistance to the War Production board," Nelson said.

"This voluntary and unsolicited action represents the highest expression of practical patriotism which if emulated by farms and woodmen in the pulpwood producing areas of the United States, will solve the problem of current and threatening pulpwood shortages and, by its broader example, help to hasten the winning of the war."

The War Production board, in cooperation with various other agencies, initiated the government-industry campaign in an at-

tempt to overcome a threatened shortage of 2,500,000 cords of pulpwood, the raw material from which smokeless powder, rayon for parachutes, containers for shipping ammunition, print and planning papers, and many other products are made.

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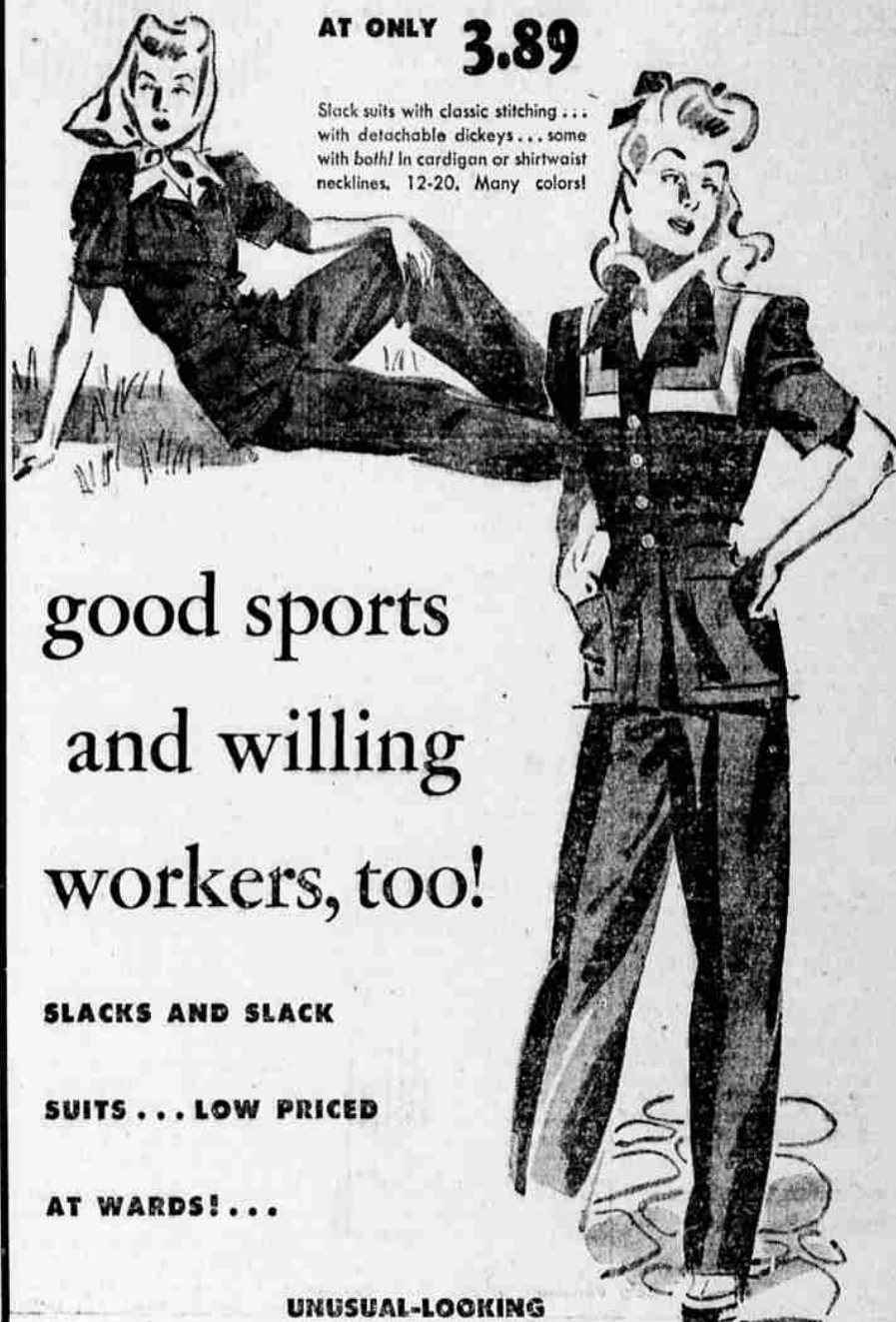
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
