LESSONS FROM FIRE

EDITORIAL By Charles V. Stanton

ROSEBURG'S disastrous uptown fire Thursday delivered a severe blow to the city's business activities. The loss of nine business establishments, even temporarily, will be keenly felt...

The disaster, however, is, or should be, partially offset by the lessons learned. One fact plainly evident was the hazard created by the type of construction which has been permitted in the business district...

Also plainly demonstrated was the totally inadequate fire equipment. That the fire department succeeded in keeping the blaze confined to the one area was almost a miracle, considering the limited fire fighting facilities...

The fire most forcibly called attention to what could happen in Roseburg in the event of an air raid with incendiary bombs. Had several such fires been raging simultaneously in widely separated areas, the town could just about have been marked off as a total loss.

A great deal of comfort, however, can be taken in the efficiency of the fire department and the civilian defense forces. An observer could not help but be impressed by the thoroughness with which reserve firemen have been trained...

The Red Cross canteen ladies were on hand with coffee and doughnuts for the fire fighters, uniting with other civilian defense units in a practical test which amply proved the efficiency gained through continued study and practice.
