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Howard Cole Sues Former Wife For Timber Licenses

Marital Wees of Couple Well Known in Roseburg Are Recited by Husband

Howard Cole, 75, ex-millionaire American lumberman, is filing court action in a fight to recover timber licenses valued at \$65,000 from his former wife, according to press reports filed from Vancouver, British Columbia.

Cole and his wife are well known in Roseburg, having spent a summer season here, two years ago.

According to the report from Vancouver, Cole testified he bought 14 Vancouver island timber licenses for \$17,000 in 1935 and for business reasons put them in the name of his wife, Anita, 28 years his junior. He said the licenses have since nearly quadrupled in value.

He told the court he and Mrs. Cole were divorced last year. The ex-wife is in court to defend the suit.

Describing his courtship, Cole said his ex-wife pursued him to New York, Washington and Palm Beach and that he finally succumbed to her wiles.

"The first night I met her she said she was going to marry me," Cole testified, according to the report from Vancouver. "But she was married all this time and while we were in Palm Beach her husband died in California and she clapped her hands for joy and married me two or three days later."

He said his marriage was one constant quarrel. He said his wife was extravagant, drank excessively and went through his pockets while he slept, the press report stated.

great damage appears to have been done.

Thirty-three RAF bombers were missing from the night's operations, making a six-day total of 135 allied bombers lost in the tempestuous campaign to pulverize Adolf Hitler's Ruhr war foundations.

Score Favors Allies.
While American fliers from middle east bases hammered the Nazi-occupied Greek mainland, allied bombers from north Africa pounded Catania, Sicily, and raided the Sardinian towns of Chilianova, Venafiorita, Golfo Aranci and Capoterra.

Twenty axis planes were shot

out of the skies over Sardinia, and nine allied planes failed to return.

An Italian communique admitted damage and casualties "of some size" in Sardinia, but asserted that 33 allied planes were shot down. The fascist command also declared that Italian torpedo planes sank three steamers totaling 31,000 out of allied convoys off north Africa.

Sea Guerrillas Busy.
Advices reaching Stockholm, Sweden, reported that sea-going Greek Guerrillas were giving the axis new cause for worry in the Balkans, preying on German and Italian merchant ships in the Aegean, with such effectiveness that the Germans had to employ heavily-armed patrol boats and reconnaissance seaplanes to hunt them down.

On the Russian front the strange lull of many weeks' duration continued to prevail, with the soviet command mentioning only a single notable action—a break into German lines "west of Belgorod."

Red army headquarters said Russian troops stormed into Nazi defenses, destroyed three large blockhouses and a series of machinegun nests, and left 180 German dead on the battlefield.

Belgorod lies 35 miles north-west of Kharkov.

Duce Purges Opponents

Other war headlines:
Italy—Premier Mussolini orders sweeping purge, demands "religious fervor" to defend invasion-threatened kingdom; Bern hears 7,000 anti-fascists arrested by Italian police.

Meanwhile, a Berlin broadcast quoted Nazi Propaganda Minister Goebbels as asserting that the axis was keeping vigil "day and night" to meet an allied invasion of Europe.

Goebbels boasted, however, that there was "no comparison between fighting in north Africa or for Pantelleria and fighting for Europe."

Lapsed Policies Spur Fire Fight By Carl Black

Tavern Operator Puts Pep In Efforts; Bank Resumes Business Under Tarpaullins.

If anyone noticed how industriously Carl Black, proprietor of Carl's Tavern, fought fire yesterday, they might be interested in the reason. The blaze, only one door from the popular restaurant, was at full height when Carl's insurance agent, H. D. Quine broke the news that Black had failed to transfer two policies which he had planned to move to Quine's agency, and that the policies had lapsed, leaving him only about one-half his normal insurance coverage. From then on, Black's work on the fire hose was indeed industrious.

Bank Resumes Business.
The Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank was open this morning for regular business, despite damp surroundings. Tarpaullins protected the workers and patrons from water still dripping through the unroofed building, but business went ahead as usual. A crew of swamper was engaged in the task of cleaning the top story, and O. and C. administration crews carried back the office furnishings, records and files which had been carried to safety during yesterday's fire, and made ready to resume business.

The bank suffered no loss to its equipment, files, etc., as all movable furniture was taken to a safe place during the blaze, and all safety deposit boxes, money and valuable property had as usual been locked in the fire-proof, waterproof vault. Lerah's Beauty shop, located in the bank building, is expected to be in operation by the first of the week, as all equipment was undamaged, and the interior of the quarters can be used after being cleaned.

Frank William Baker Of Wilbur Passes On

Frank William Baker, 74, died Wednesday at his home at Wilbur, where he has resided for the past year. Born in Darlington, Wis., Oct. 18, 1868, he came to Douglas county from Wyoming. Food Czar Proposal Criticized by Roosevelt

ple would be able to pay higher prices and the poor would suffer but that surplus buying power would be eliminated.

Mr. Roosevelt agreed that the poorer people certainly would suffer under such conditions. **Spiral Is Described**
Describing what he meant by an inflationary spiral in response to a question, the chief executive said that the cost of food is about a third of a family's income, and with larger wages, everybody is eating more now at greatly increased prices.

People with the largest financial gains, he said, still have a surplus of funds even after buying their war bond quotas, and if prices keep going up a lot of people, most of them relatively small wage earners, will have to spend a great deal more for food. Then they will demand more pay and probably get it, he said, which would mean production costs and costs to farmers would go up. That would lead to requests for higher wages, he said, and then cost to farmers would rise again, and so on.

The president entered a denial when asked about reports that food Administrator Chester Davis had submitted his resignation because he felt he has inadequate powers.

Mr. Roosevelt said the last he had heard from Davis was when he asked the administration if the latter would like to run the OPA

and the War Production board estimated.

Punishment Demanded
The War Labor board went to War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes with a stern request that the government compel the United Mine workers to comply with the board's order or that punishment be imposed.

Board members told Byrnes that the country's largest corporations, U. S. Steel (in the federal shipbuilding case) and General Motors, complied with the WLB orders, however reluctantly, but that in the coal case only the operators have been penalized. Their mines have been seized although they are ready to obey the WLB.

Full compliance would mean the signing of a two-year contract containing a pledge not to strike for the duration of the war. The contract handed down by the board would permit reopening of the wage clauses in the interim plus some concessions such as higher vacation payments, and free tools and equipment.

WLB members said penalties against the miners were not intended but that the union, as such, should be brought to book for defiance. The penalties might take the form of a suspension of the dues checkoff or freezing of the UMW treasury.

Ickes told reporters he could see no way to make any "private individual or group" sign an agreement and, when asked if he favored a law that would compel them to do so, expressed doubt that any legislative body would pass one or that it would be constitutional.

and Davis replied: "God forbid."

Congress Given Warning
Meanwhile CIO President Philip Murray served notice on a congressional committee that unless an effective roll-back and subsidy program are operating by July 15, organized labor would be compelled to demand that the hold-the-line order against inflation be scrapped.

Murray delivered the ultimatum before a special congressional committee studying consumer problems.

Insisting that congress support the president's price roll-back program, supported by subsidies, he said that labor could not meet increased living costs under present wage ceilings unless congress acted immediately.

He was followed by Mayor La Guardia of New York who testified that "hell will break loose in this country" unless "congress gives immediate attention" to the food and price situation.

"What other course is there for labor to follow?" Murray asked after stating labor's position. He said he spoke for all organized labor in demanding that something be done to hold down living costs.

Murray accused congress of having failed to "live up to its commitments" to stabilize prices and hold down living costs.

Senate Opposition Grows
Meantime growing senate opposition to using government funds to subsidize lower retail food prices threatened the administration's plan to roll back the cost of living.

Originally given but an outside chance, a proposal by Senator Clark (D-Mo.) to strip federal agencies of subsidy-paying authority appeared to have gained strength through eleven-hour inclusion of a clause retaining payments for commodities essential to the war effort.

Price Administrator Brown in a radio speech last night defended subsidies as a benefit to consumers.

Two more subs are listed as having been destroyed off California, one by planes.

Other underwater raiders are reported to have been sent to the bottom in northern California and Oregon waters by planes and surface craft. One of these was blasted three days after the war began.

The compilation made for the newspapers does not include sinkings by army planes, which, the Times said, "have been equally effective."

AN ADVANCED SOUTH PACIFIC BASE, June 25—(AP)—United States bombers raided three Japanese bases in the Solomons by daylight today, starting fires around airport runways and bivouac areas.

South Pacific headquarters announced a force of Liberators bombed Buaka, at the northern tip of Bougainville island, and Kahili at the southern end, starting fires near the runways of airbases at both places as well as in encampment areas.

A "fairly heavy" force of Dauntless and Avenger bombers, covered by Wildcat fighters, hit the Munda bay area and set off a number of fires in a bivouac area.

All the planes returned safely.

Half-Million Gals. Of Water Poured On Roseburg Fire

More than 500,000 gallons of water were poured on the blazing buildings in yesterday's fire in the Roseburg business district, H. C. Wells, local Copco manager, reported today. Full capacities of the Copco pumping plant were utilized to keep water supplies adequate during the progress of the fire.

The Roseburg fire engine, with 1,250 gallons per minute capacity, pumped at the rate of 1,200 gallons per minute for three and one-half hours, while the pump from the Veterans facility pumped at the rate of 650 gallons per minute for nearly three hours. In addition, the smaller pump brought to the scene by the Douglas Forest Protective association crew was in service for an hour or more, and hoses, without booster pressure, carried water from all available hydrants. Fourteen lines of hose, totaling between 4,000 and 5,000 feet, were laid by the firemen.

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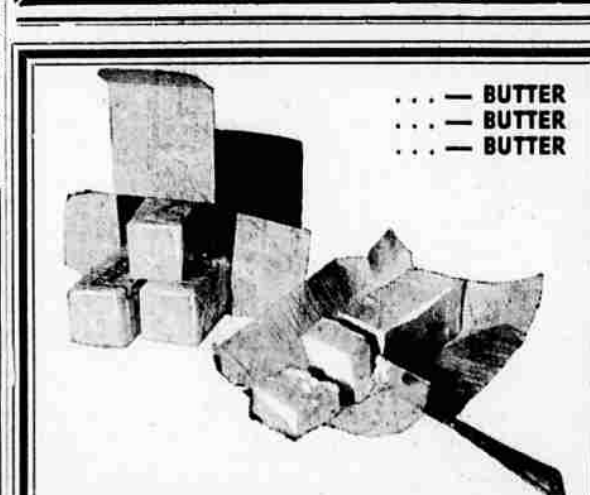
