Navy Recruiter Dated in Roseburg

Men between the ages of 17 and 50 will have an opportunity to obtain full information relative to navy enlistment, Tuesday and Wednesday, when Chief Specialist W. E. Bell, recruiter in charge for this district, will visit Roseburg on a Douglas county recruiting tour. Bell will headquarters at the chamber of commerce. "Douglas county enjoys an enviable record from the standpoint of voluntary enlistments," Bell said, "and we feel sure that eligible men, who can qualify for naval service, will continue to enlist and enable Douglas county to maintain its present high place on the enlistment thermometer."

In addition to providing data effecting men, full information for women between the ages of 20 and 36, interested in joining the WAVES will be available, Bell added.

Spring Pig Crop Sets New Record

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—The Agriculture department estimated today the 1943 spring pig crop totaled 74,059,000 head, or 15 per cent more than the record crop of 1931 and 22 per cent more than last year. The department said also that reports from farmers on farrowing plans indicated a 1943 fall pig crop of about 53,000,000 head, or an increase of about 9,000,000 or 21 per cent over the 1942 fall crop.

If borne out, the combined spring and fall crops would give a total 1943 production of about 127,000,000 head compared with 105,000,000 last year and a ten-year average of 73,148,000.

The prospective fall crop is considerably larger than War Food Administrator Davis had recommended. Because of dwindling livestock feed supplies, particularly corn, Davis had asked that the fall crop be increased not more than ten per cent.

Livestock Shipments to Break Record, Forecast

CHICAGO, June 26.—(AP)—Record breaking livestock shipments were forecast today for the final quarter of 1943, with hogs up 26 per cent and cattle 11 per cent higher than in the last three months of 1942. The number of livestock on farms the beginning of this year

was estimated at 158,900,000, or a gain of 11 per cent over January, 1942, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported.

Three big factors which will influence the market next fall were the amount of feed produced, transportation facilities and the volume of slaughtering that the packers can handle.

The Department of Agriculture stated any curtailment in feed production from set goals might force livestock marketing in volume approaching full liquidation of the current animal population. The agency estimated today marketing of hogs at 77,000,000 head with fourth quarter shipments at 24,500,000. A year ago hog marketing totaled 62,500,000.

Diamond Lake Road to East Connection Open

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—The Diamond lake road was declared officially open for travel this morning from the west through to The Dallas-California highway on the east, according to J. G. Bromley, resident maintenance engineer of the state highway department here. The highway to Crater lake, now closed seven miles beyond the Diamond lake junction, is expected to be open by the fourth of July, Bromley said.

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 26.—(AP)—A Brazilian air force plane was reliably reported today to have destroyed an axle U-boat in the Atlantic 65 miles northeast of Rio de Janeiro.

Kaiser Company Under Charges Of Bad Management

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—(AP)—Charges of such gross mismanagement of one Henry J. Kaiser company shipyard that not one ship has been delivered in the more than a year the yard has been in operation were made before a house merchant marine subcommittee here yesterday.

Alonso Bryan, an auditor for the U. S. maritime commission, told the committee accounting procedures at the Kaiser company's No. 3 yard in Richmond, Calif., have led to "one of the greatest messes anyone could ever get into."

At Detroit, Kaiser commented that the manager of the No. 3 yard is C. P. Bedford who also manages the adjacent No. 1 and No. 2 yards, and added those yards this month are delivering 24 or 25 Liberty ships at a cost of 275,000 to 300,000 man-hours per ship, which he said was "just one-half of the national average for all shipyards."

Kaiser said Bedford has managed construction of more than 200 ships and had received "about the highest commendation ever given any one by Lord Halifax" for his performance on a British contract.

Bryan said five ships have been launched at the yard but none has been completely outfitted for service. Five more ships are on the ways.

Five Richmond foremen followed Bryan on the stand. Each charged that "dam builders" and "concrete mixers" had taken charge of yard No. 3 and had caused a breakdown of morale.

Kaiser said delays in building the transport ships in the No. 3 yard were attributable to changes in design, to shortage of skilled manpower, and to the transfer of operations to a contract for 45 ships for the navy accepted by the Kaiser interests "against our protest." These ships, he said, required "an unusual amount of electrical and mechanical work" and there was a shortage of men skilled in such work.

Address in Phone Book Bases Suit for \$20,000

KANSAS CITY, June 25.—(AP)—It's not the wrong number, Miss Margaret Beiser acknowledges in her \$20,000 damage suit against Southwestern Bell Telephone company—it's the address. Previous directories had given her employer, the divorced Dr. O. Jason Dixon, an alternative telephone number (Miss Beiser's), so patients could call her if the doctor were unavailable. The new directory, her suit complains, flatly lists Dr. Dixon as living at her residence. And this, the petition says, tends to expose her to public contempt, wrath, and ridicule—\$20,000 worth.

AFL Raps Quota, Wage Formula

EUGENE, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—The Oregon State Federation of Labor wants the quota system of meat distribution discontinued and the "little steel" wage formula relaxed.

A resolution against the meat quota plan was adopted at the closing session of the annual convention yesterday after J. D. McDonald, Portland Meatcutters' union secretary-treasurer, charged that quotas result in a "squeeze by the big packers to put the little packers and retailers out of business."

The resolution accused larger packing firms of creating a false meat shortage by refusing to kill their quotas. McDonald said most employees of the OPA meat division formerly worked for big packers.

The "little steel" formula limiting wage increases to 15 per cent should either be abolished, another resolution read, or lifted to provide increases in keeping with increased living costs. The War Labor board was condemned for delays in deciding cases.

Other resolutions asked the regional War Labor board to set up a fair minimum wage, objected to the Oregon liquor control commission's "policy of paying low salaries," and pledged the federation's cooperation in post-war planning.
