

Scoring Schedule Set in Contest Of 4-H Gardeners

4-H club victory gardening members are getting their projects in shape for scoring sometime during the next two weeks. The committee from the Roseburg Lions club, in company with County Club Agent E. A. Britton, will score these gardens in the production contest during this time.

A schedule made up is as follows: This evening the committee will go to Glendale and Glenary; tomorrow, during the day, gardens will be scored at Drain, Yoncalla and Scotts Valley; tomorrow evening the committee goes to Umpqua. On Wednesday of this week, during the day, committees will go to Myrtle Creek, Days Creek and Riddle; Thursday evening the Brookway gardens will be scored. On Friday evening the Elgarose gardens will be visited.

The scoring beginning on Tuesday, July 6, will include Garden Valley, in the evening, and on Wednesday, during the day, Oakland and Sutherlin. On Thursday evening of next week, the committee scores at Dillard, and on Friday evening of next week they complete their scoring for the valley section by going to the Callahan settlement. Gardens of the coast section will be scored by a committee of the Reedsport Lions club and County Club Agent Britton.

These are being scored as part of the program included in the foods production contest sponsored by the Umpqua Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Roseburg Lions club for the inland section, and the coast section is sponsored by the Reedsport Lions club. The livestock and poultry projects will be scored late in August and the canning projects will be scored sometime in September. In scoring a victory garden, the committee will take into consideration the size of the garden, the variety of vegetables, the yield of the crops, plan of the garden relating to the continuous supply, neatness and state of cultivation, freedom from insects, disease and rodents and the efficient use of water, if irrigated. In addition to this, the neatness and accuracy of the member's record book will be considered as well as his or her knowledge of gardening. A letter has been sent to each member enrolled giving the date of the visit for scoring.

Axis Knockout Nearing, Gen. McNarney Asserts

manner that the whole empire will feel its full impact in a most violent and destructive way.

In this, he declared, "our allies are with us and we are united in our efforts to defeat the axis," and added, "the combined chiefs of staff have well-defined plans to accomplish this end."

McNarney asserted recent conferences with Prime Minister Churchill in Washington and in North Africa in which French officials participated "will bring further successful offensive action."

Senator Gurney warned the general of a growing tendency among some to feel "the war is going to be over on Thanksgiving Day" and that his statement that the allies were "rapidly approaching" victory might make them feel that they were "on the right track."

McNarney's only concession was that might be a "slight overstatement."

Huge Army Cited

Pointing out that the nation had only 2,500,000 partially-trained and equipped men in the army last year, McNarney declared "we have in the service at this moment in the vicinity of 6,800,000."

The army had no plans, he said, for raiding its armed forces beyond the 8,200,000 officers and men, including 150,000 WAACs, set for its goal by the end of this year.

S. chamber of commerce. The convention was given over to studies of publicity, civilian defense and post-war planning, pinniger reports.

Allied Planes Blast Greek, Italian Ports

On other battle fronts on this day marking the 29th anniversary of the assassination at Sarajevo:

Psychological war—Italian newspapers sought to rally the public for attack. Paraphrasing Churchill's words when invasion threatened England, one paper declared each city would become a fort, defended street by street, by soldiers with cannon and the people with "guns and knives."

Russia—the great eastern front still remained relatively inactive, but on the Karelian isthmus, scene of bitter but local fighting in the last few days, the soviet reported capture of a Finnish stronghold in hand-to-hand combat. In the air, the Russians announced a toll of 211 nazis planes for the week ended last Saturday.

Blows At Japanese

South Pacific—attacks on two Japanese submarines over the weekend, 200 miles southwest of Suva in the Fiji islands and in the southern Coral sea, were reported by south Pacific headquarters. One was possibly destroyed. New raids on Japanese strongpoints in the Solomons were disclosed. Allied headquarters in Australia also reported fresh attacks in New Guinea, particularly on the enemy supply route between Lae and Madang.

Burma—without loss, U. S. bombers again attacked enemy-held railroads and plants in central Burma and the RAF bombed Japanese troop quarters on Akyab island.

DeGaulle Is Warned

Political—unofficial but emphatic notice has been given Gen. Charles DeGaulle that the allied commander in north Africa would tolerate no interference in his invasion preparations due to French political arguments. Kirke L. Simpson of the Associated Press reported from Washington. Disclosure of this strong position being taken by the United States and Britain was made at a time when "trans-Mediterranean operations on a major scale" are "closely impending," Simpson said.

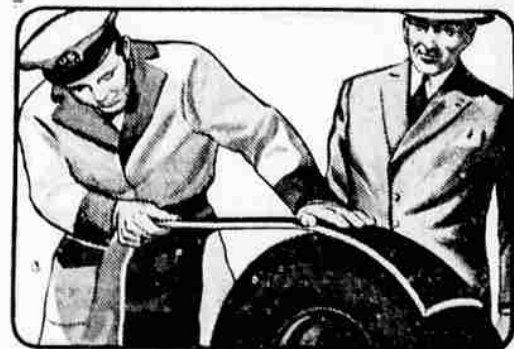
