## 14 Axis U-Boats Sunk in 2 Weeks

OTTAWA, June 29.—(AP)—Malcolm MacDonald, British high commissioner to Canada, said today at least 14 enemy submarines had been sunk in the past two weeks and predicted that the allied assault on Europe would start very soon.

"We have had a dead submarine served up for breakfast every day," for the past fortnight, MacDonald said.

(His statement was added evidence of allied ascendancy in the critical battle of the Atlantic, which Prime Minister Churchill said recently the allies were winning. Recent reports from London have said submarines have been sunk at a rate of better than one a day for the past two months, a rate faster than the German ability to replace them.)

MacDonald said that the allies "obviously are approaching another great crisis of the war."

He said there might be "comparatively small" assaults on Germany and German occupied territory, which should not be regarded immediately as the opening of a second front.

The commissioner said the allied anti-submarine efforts had been so successful in recent months that tables had been turned completely on axis U-boats in the North Atlantic. He said this condition was a necessary prelude to allied assault on Europe.

Another was the complete conquest of north Africa with its corollary shortening of the sea route to the middle east, he said.

Thomas Jennie, 59, died at his home in Edenbrow this morning following a long period of ill health. Born May 5, 1884, at Eau Claire, Wis., he had made his home in Roseburg for the past 55 years.

Surviving are his wife and the following sons and daughters: Vernon, Virgil and Frank Jennie, Violet Pendergrass and Lillian Chapin, all of Roseburg. He also leaves a brother, Rudolph Jennie, Tenmile.

The Rev. C. A. Edwards will conduct funeral services at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 2 p. m. Friday. Interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery.

## Dr. Townsend Urges His Plan's Adoption Now

PORTLAND, June 28.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, old-age

pension leader, wants his plan adopted before the war ends to ward off a post-war depression. Advocating a three per cent withholding tax on gross incomes to provide payments of \$100 per month to persons over 60 and unemployed service men, he told an audience here yesterday that unless this is done a severe post-war depression will result.

He said that one per cent of the tax would be used to end state sales and income taxes.
