MARTHA SHAMBERGER SPEAKS AT HEALTH MEETING TUESDAY

The Douglas County Health association held a meeting Tuesday evening, June 22, in the courthouse, at which time a very interesting report was given by Martha Shamberger, state statistician for the State Tuberculosis association. The theme of her talk presented the problem of being unable to secure workers enough at the state hospitals and statistics were read, showing that 190 beds out of 320 beds were unused in the hospital at Salem because of the shortage of helpers. Nurses are needed very badly among the non-professional workers, as a large majority of the people have left for better pay in war industry.

It was stated that in England, the tuberculosis hospitals were evacuated at the beginning of the war and the patients were sent home, putting a heavy burden on the public health unit and causing an increase of tuberculosis among the people.

Because of the possibility of being harmful, the victory course required in the public schools, was discussed and it was suggested that every boy and girl entering into these activities be subject to a thorough physical examination in order to detect any heart ailment, unsuspected tuberculosis, etc.

During the meeting, plans were made to purchase new films on tuberculosis and its cure.

Farm WAR NEWS

FARM MACHINERY FOR 1944

While the Douglas county USDA War board has not yet received details of the procedure for rationing farm machinery next year, it has received word indicating that some of the 1944 equipment may be available for fall planting this year. The War Production board has just issued the 1944 farm machinery order, permitting output equal to 80 per cent of the value of machinery produced in 1940. This is approximately double 1943's quota of 40 per cent. Manufacturers will also be allowed greater leeway in the production of various types and models of machinery. No limit has been placed on production of repair parts.

AGRICULTURAL BAGS

Good news for Oregon farmers is contained in an announcement from the War Food administration on the agricultural bag outlook, the county USDA War board reports. Substantial supplies of heavyweight burlap bags are expected to be available as a result of a special allocation of materials. There'll be a considerable number of new cotton bags for sale, too, as manufacturers will have a good supply of osanburg material. However, the War board reminds, there is still need for conserving and re-using bags already on hand.

SAVE THE TRUCK

The recent warning from Petroleum Administration: Ickes that the critical gasoline shortage in the east may spread to other areas, brought a reminder this week to Douglas county farmers to "make every mile a useful mile." Besides the gasoline situation, the scarcity of new trucks is another important reason for keeping mileage at a minimum, reports the County Farm Transportation committee. Very few new or used trucks are available for replacement. Here are some of the things county farmers are asked to avoid to make present trucks last longer:

1. Driving a truck empty when a full or partial load is available.
2. Taking a truck to town with a partial load where regular collection service is available.
3. Using a heavy truck for jobs that a pickup or passenger car do.

The committee urges farmers to pool their hauling with neighbors wherever possible.

WHEN IS MEAT BLACK?

County residents who want to help win the food front battle on the home front should be on watch for four types of black market activity, the county War Meat committee advises. They are: Selling meat without ration stamps, selling meat above ceiling prices, dealing in livestock or selling meat without dealer or livestock permits, selling more meat than allowed under slaughter quotas.

BARLEY LOAN RATE

Commodity Credit's announcement of a 1943 barley rate of 80 cents a bushel assures Douglas county farmers of a favorable return for that crop, the county AAA committee reports. This rate is for No. 1 barley and is 20 cents higher than the 1942 loan rate. The rate for No. 2 barley is 78 cents a bushel, and grades down to No. 5 are eligible. Loans will be made on barley stored on farms, or in approved warehouses providing storage is paid by the grower.

A loan rate of 75 cents a bushel for eye grading No. 2 or better has been announced also.

HOW FARMERS CAN HELP

Douglas county farmers who want to know what they can do to help wipe out black markets and make the nation's food distribution program effective are given an S-point program by the county War Meat committee. The points are:

1. Never sell rationed foods—including meat, butter and cheese, without collecting ration points.
2. Never buy rationed food

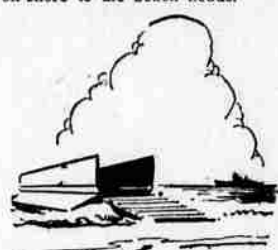

without surrendering ration stamps.

3. Never pay more than the ceiling price for any food.
4. Never charge more than the ceiling price for any food.
5. Always register as a seller if you sell rationed food, and obtain required permits.
6. Observe grading requirements where they are involved in purchases and sales.
7. Send stamps collected for rationed food sales with a monthly report to the local ration board.
8. Destroy any ration stamps left over when they expire at the end of and rationing period.

PAYMENT DEADLINE

Douglas county growers of potatoes and vegetable truck crops are reminded by the county AAA committee that they must indicate intention to participate in the incentive payment program by June 30 to be eligible for the special payments to be made for these crops under the Food-for-Freedom program. Growers who were mailed an "intention" form should sign and return it at once. Those who did not receive a form, but believe they are eligible, should call at the county AAA office before Wednesday, June 30.

FARM LUMBER RATING

The county USDA war board is now in a position to assist farmers who are unable to obtain lumber for essential farm construction.

The War Food administration has obtained 500 million board feet of lumber to take care of farm needs through September. Douglas county has been given an allocation of lumber, and has been authorized to issue certificates bearing an AA-2 preference rating. Farmers may use the rating to obtain lumber from dealers, who may, in turn, extend the rating to mills to replace their stocks. The certificates may be used to purchase lumber for maintenance and repair work and for construction necessary to production. Lumber obtained under the program may not be used for dwellings.

FEED WHEAT RESUMED

Resumption of the feed wheat program, following congressional authorization to Commodity Credit for sale of an additional 50 million bushels of wheat, will take care of the immediate situation for county farmers, the county USDA war board believes. However, the need still remains

for careful management of feed supplies, especially hay, and the War board suggests that every farmer use every means he can to increase his own feed production and reduce his dependence on purchased feeds.
