Senate Group Ups House-Voted Fund For War Agencies

WASHINGTON, June 30 - (AP) - The senate appropriations committee recommended passage today of a \$3,000,000,000 house-approved war agencies bill to which it added \$3,501,499 to carry on in a limited way, the operations of the Office of War Information's domestic branch.

The house had sought to halt all domestic activities of Elmer Davis' agency by allowing nothing for that work.

The bill, which Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) said he would call up later in the day, provided \$25,000,000 for OWI's foreign service branch, as compared with a subcommittee recommendation of \$27,003,590.

These two items, coupled with a house-allowed \$5,800,000 for contingencies, raised OWI's appropriation to \$33,501,499.

As approved by the committee the measure raised house allowances for the OPA by \$47,000,000 to a total of \$177,000,000 and removed house bans against payments of subsidies to roll back retail food prices, grade labeling requirements and against employment of any official with less than five years practical experience in the industry in which he officiates. (The ban on subsidies is included in other legislation.)

The committee added \$300,000 to its subcommittee's recommendations for OWI's domestic branch to provide funds for paying accrued leave of employees whose dismissal would be required, but kept restrictions against its preparation, publication or distribution of "pamphlets or other literature."

In another field, the committee attached a rider to the war agencies bill which, if enacted, would require senate confirmation of all employees of those agencies making in excess of \$4,500 a year. The language, similar to that in the McKellar bill recently passed by the senate and now stymied in the house civil service committee, was written into the war agencies appropriations bill at the request of McKellar.

Take time to meditate. The religion of Christ is more than demonstration. There is a time for everything. There is a time for noise, and there is a time for quietness. Do not mistake noise for power, and do not mistake stagnation for quiet worship. The Bible teaches us that there are demonstration of divine power, expressed in the tornado and the earthquake, and there are demonstrations of divine quietness as when God speaks with the "still small voice." Demonstrations in the spirit are seasons of grace and power, but many put a premium on noise in religion just for the sake of making a noise. The religion of Christ is much more than demonstration. It goes much deeper. God intends that we shall be enthusiastic in religion, as in other pursuits, but no matter how enthusiastic our temperaments may be, there are times when we need to be still. A dynamo usually makes but little noise, yet it gathers great power. We need to be still in order that we may meditate. Meditation makes strong Christians. No man can maintain a strong spiritual life who takes no time for meditation. He needs to stop to consider what he is and where he is, to search the foundations of his faith and see if they are secure. Be still and know that I am God. Amen.

Value of Heating Oil Coupons Announced

WASHINGTON, July 1 - (AP) - The value of heating oil coupons for the first heating period of next season, good from July 1, 1943, to January 3, 1944, was set yesterday at 10 gallons a coupon in the 33 states under fuel oil rationing.

The coupons are those numbered 1 on the new ration sheets and represent about 1/6 of the household's total heating ration, the OPA estimated in making the value announcement.

Period 5 coupons remaining from last year's allotment are still good and may be used along with the new coupons to fill tanks during the summer months.

Oregon Slaughterers' Permits to Be Checked

PORTLAND, July 1 - (AP) - Permits of all Oregon butchers and slaughterers will be checked soon to determine if slaughter quotas are conforming to each firm's history, the USDA War board said today.

The survey will be made by county board meat committees to regulate supplies for the armed forces and civilians.

Vitamin D Patents Invalid, Court Holds

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1 - (AP) - Patents governing the manufacture of vitamin D, said to have brought more than \$7,500,000 in royalties to the University of Wisconsin alumni research foundation, were declared by the U. S. circuit court of appeals to be invalid.

PORTLAND, July 1 - (AP) - Return of Japanese—even loyal ones—to the Pacific coast before the war is over has been opposed by 121 of 123 organizations polled by the Portland chamber of commerce. The group included other chambers and veterans organizations.

National Forests of Oregon Under Closure

SALEM, Ore., June 30. - (AP) - Governor Snell issued a proclamation today providing for regulat-

ed closure of all national forests. The proclamation was asked by the U. S. Forest service.

Persons traveling in national forests, except on regularly traveled roads, will have to carry an ax, bucket and shovel, build fires only in posted camp grounds, have permits for any fires, and to refrain from passing through timber.

About 820 youths now are working in the forests under supervision of the state forester.
