

Milk Price Boost Ordered by OPA Held Inadequate

Production May Continue, However, if Feed Supplies Ample, Pinniger States

Increased milk prices authorized by the Office of Price Administration fail to meet the needs of producers and distributors, but may enable the dairy industry to continue production, providing there is ample local feed production, Harry Pinniger, chairman of the state investigating committee, reported today. Pinniger headed a committee appointed by Governor Snell to

gather production cost figures to support the contention of need for higher wholesale and retail prices to prevent collapse of the dairy industry and a milk famine in Oregon. The committee recently met with the regional OPA directors at San Francisco, where the committee findings were presented at a formal hearing.

"The regional office apparently is gambling upon good feed conditions," Pinniger said. "If feed is available through home production, or if prices for commercial feeds are lowered, the producers and distributors possibly can get by on the rates fixed by the OPA. A shortage of feed, or sustained high prices on commercial feeds, however, will make dairy operation unprofitable."

Distributors Benefited

The OPA was requested, Pinniger said, to base its rates on a cost plus basis, in accordance with a formula which would take into consideration the various factors controlling milk production and distribution. The application of the formula would have resulted in a price of 90 cents per pound for butterfat in the Roseburg milkshed. The OPA, however, has authorized an increase from 80 to 85 cents per pound. While wholesale and retail prices were raised from 11 and 13 cents per quart to 11.75 and 13.5 cents.

The change, Pinniger said, will be particularly beneficial to the distributors, who have been operating at considerable loss. In order to keep a milk supply for the city, distributors increased payments to growers from 65 cents to 80 cents per pound, although they were allowed only a one-cent per quart increase on wholesale and retail prices.

ashore, MacArthur's spokesman said. Australian patrols in the Salamaua area were reported to be seeking a junction from a point inland with the Americans on the beach. Continuously striving to pin to the ground the enemy's potent air strength at Rabaul, New Britain, allied Liberators sent 22 tons of bombs down on its three air-dromes Thursday, following up an attack Wednesday in which 23 tons were dropped.

(By the Associated Press) Japanese imperial headquarters asserted today their forces sank six allied warships and three transports, damaged five other vessels and shot down 77 planes in the Rendova island area in the Solomons Wednesday and Thursday during the successful American landings there.

These claims, characteristic of the reports of great successes the Japanese frequently issued for propaganda purposes, were at great variance with acknowledged allied losses.

Roseburg Youths Save Companion in River

Jerry Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Brown, and Don De Bernardi, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. De Bernardi combined forces Wednesday to rescue a 14-year old companion from the South Umpqua river at the Mosher street swimming hole. The victim fell from a rock into deep water. He was unable to swim and was near drowning when Brown reached him. Brown had considerable difficulty in towing the struggling youth and was near exhaustion when De Bernardi reached the scene to finish the job of getting the non-swimmer ashore.

is interpreted," the president said, "it will have a devastating effect upon our economy and our war effort about which I believe the congress and the American people ought clearly to be warned."

He put his warning into three parts: 1. "This bill blacks out the program to reduce the cost of living. It completely outlaws the recent reductions in the price of meat and butter which we instituted in order to help get the cost of living back down from the height to which it has risen in recent months."

"By this measure, the congress will compel every housewife to pay five cents a pound more for every piece of butter that goes on her table, and pay higher prices for every pork chop, every ounce of beef, every slice of ham or bacon which goes to feed her family."

2. "This measure will make it virtually impossible to institute any additional measures to reduce the cost of living or even to hold the line."

3. "The bill denies to the executive any power to purchase farm products for resale at a loss or to make incentive payments to obtain increased production of foodstuffs without the approval of the congress. I do not believe that the congress has had an opportunity to know or to consider how seriously it may cripple our entire food program."

Mr. Roosevelt contended that the legislation would virtually nullify the economic stabilization act of last October since, he said, the cost of living can not be stabilized effectively by the government if the cost of necessary foods can not be stabilized.

Pleads For Harmony

In an appeal for greater harmony, the chief executive said that congress and the executive must work together as a team in "saving our free economy."

He expressed a hope that if the legislators could not agree before a summer recess on legislation eliminating what he called the serious effects in the CCC bill, they would pass a resolution continuing the agency's life and increasing its borrowing power until they could draft another measure.

The bill would have continued for two years the CCC, whose main function is lending funds to producers to finance marketing of agricultural commodities. The ban on price reducing subsidies was written into it.

Mr. Roosevelt said the experiences of such countries as Canada and England demonstrated that limited subsidies "can and must be effectively used as a key weapon to control inflation."

He said failure to stabilize the cost of living would lead to increasing demands from workers for a drastic modification of the little steel wage formula.

NAZI INDUSTRY NOW LAGS PAST HOPE OF VICTORY

LONDON, July 2.—(AP)—Strained by nearly four years of total war and hammered day and night by allied air power, German industry has lost the production race essential to victory, although Germany still has plenty of fight left, reliable British and foreign sources indicated today.

Figures gathered by these sources suggest that Germany has positively passed her peak as a war-making power and now is on the downgrade because of a production decline. More conclusive evidence of this will appear within the year, it was said.

A steady fall in steel production, a narrow margin of oil reserves, an inability to replace vital railway equipment, reduction in tank and plane production and other important symptoms of industrial deterioration appeared in the available figures, the sources said.

Tied in with reported electric power difficulties, which were magnified by the RAF's destruction of the Moehne and Eder dams, was an oil shortage.

According to the best information, the reich now is getting around 5,000,000 tons of natural oil yearly from the Rumanian fields and between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 tons from synthetic

plants. Production is said to be just about keeping abreast of consumption.

FASCISTS WRITERS DECRY SEPARATE PEACE PLAN

BERN, Switzerland, July 2.—(AP)—Fascist propagandists, taking a new tack in their campaign to bolster the Italian will to fight, were busily engaged today in developing the thesis that Italy has nothing to gain by a separate peace and her only course is to resist to the end.

No less an authority than Virginio Gayda, Italy's best known journalist and a fascist party spokesman, hammered home this idea in an article in the Giornale d'Italia which apparently reflected concern over allied attempts to convince the Italian people they would do well to get out of the war now.

"An eventual exit of Italy from the war—that is, the conclusion of a separate peace, which would never succeed—would in no way free the Italians from the war, its tragedy and destruction," Gayda wrote.

While making no direct reference to Germany, Gayda alluded to her indirectly in elaborating this point when he declared that in the event Italy made a separate peace the remaining belligerents would make Italy a battle ground.

Gayda's article was a straightforward exposition of the theme which the Italian press has been harping on daily—that no matter what the Italian people wish, they have no recourse but to fight and that their only hope is to string along with fascism.

Lavaro Fascista echoed the theme developed by Gayda, declaring that "no one would have respect for the people of a nation which surrendered without combat."
