**McNary Thinks F. D. R. to
Be 4th Term Nominee**

SALEM, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Senator Charles L. McNary, who was undertaking farm work at his rural home north of Salem on Monday less than five hours after his arrival from Washington, D. C., believes "the president is trying to do too much. He accepts too many responsibilities." McNary said farm life and the work it entails in a year of manpower shortage would prove a rest from Washington, where he declared Monday, "there are too many agencies with jurisdiction over the same problem."

Planning to remain in Oregon until September, the state's senior senator said he would get around some "to learn what the people are thinking" but denied there would be any politics in his mind, announced he would return to the nation's capital should some unforeseen crisis arise and frankly declared "I think Roosevelt will get the nomination for a fourth term. Whether he will be elected is something else."

**State Cops, Civic Head
Help in Hay Harvest**

Oregon state policemen are not only good law enforcement officers but they also are good field hands, according to Merle Austin, Fern Florist. Officers Morgan and Morris of the local state police headquarters, together with James Mess, chamber of commerce president, spent the Fourth of July holiday at the Austin farm at Green, where with Austin and a farm hand the crew of five men put up 12 acres of hay in two and one-half hours.

The town members of the crew reported they enjoyed the work and invited themselves back for another round at a later date, Austin stated.

**Edyth T. Weathered,
Oregon Historian, Dies**

PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—Funeral services will be held here Friday for Mrs. Edyth Tozier Weathered, northwest historian and lecturer, who died here yesterday at the age of 79.

Born at Tualatin, she assisted in the organization of the Lewis & Clark fair here in 1905, the Alaska Sourdough society and the Veteran Steamboatmen of the Northwest. A former director of the Oregon State fair, she represented the state at three eastern fairs. With her brother, Albert Tozier, she was in charge of historic Champoeg park for six years.

**Civilians Are Assured
Synthetic Tires in '44**

SEATTLE, July 6.—(AP)—Synthetic rubber tires for general civilian use probably will be available by next April. P. W. Litchfield, chairman of the board of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company, asserted yesterday.

Here, to study production problems of war industries, Litchfield said: "By October this country's output of synthetic rubber will equal

the average crude rubber production before the war.

"At the present time the entire stock of synthetic rubber is going to military uses and civilian needs directly connected with the war effort. However, after April, there should be a sufficient supply both to meet war needs and supply tires for general consumer use."

**Oregon Flier Killed
In Crash in Arizona**

KINGHAM, Ariz., July 6.—(AP)—Flight Officer Benjamin O. Horsley of Bonanza, Ore., was killed instantly when a training plane on a routine flight crashed on a runway yesterday at the Kingham army air force training field. Nine other airmen were injured.

**M. Christopherson
Passes at Eugene**

Marlowe A. Christopherson, 37, died at Eugene Monday, following a long period of ill health. Born April 18, 1906, in Roseburg, he had resided in Roseburg and vicinity continuously except for the past year spent in Eugene in the employ of the Southern Pacific company.

A son of Mrs. Christine Christopherson, he is survived by his mother; a brother, Holger Christopherson, Seattle, and a sister, Mrs. Lily McGuire, The Dalles.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday, July 8, at 2 p. m. at the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home, conducted by the Rev. J. B. Needham. Interment will follow in the Elgarose cemetery.

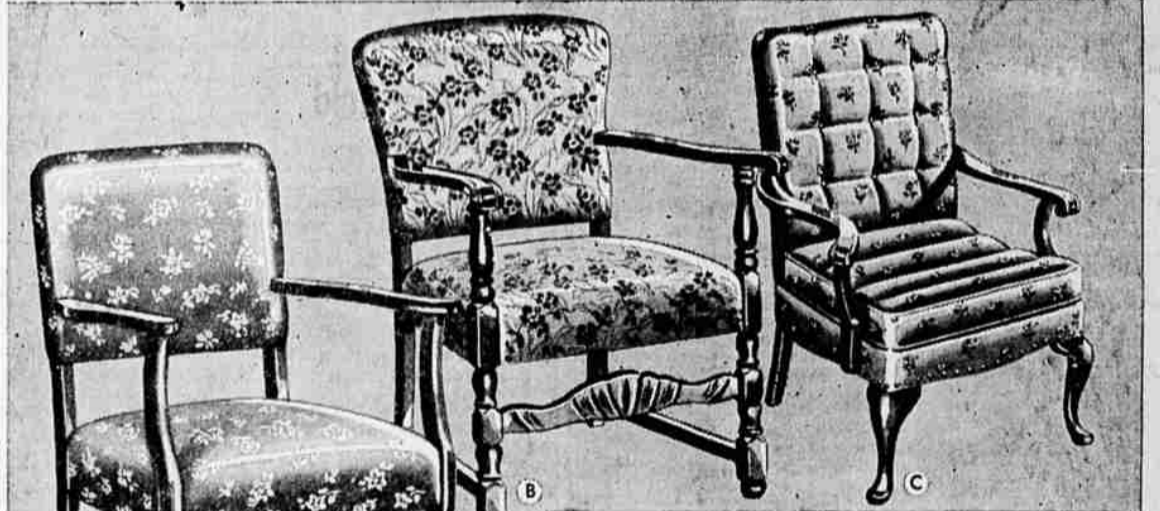

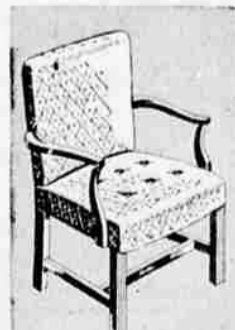

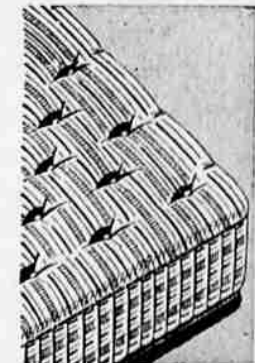
