Subsidy Proposal Is Advanced in Senate

up to \$525,000,000 for the subsidy-roll back plan but a sudden senate revolt threw out the proposal and substituted one to outlaw the payments. A similar provision was vetoed by President Roosevelt six days ago.

Two of the senate conferees declared they were hopeful, however, of at least inserting an expression of congressional opposition to subsidies in the bill.

A strong declaration of disapproval, they said, definitely would place responsibility for the rollback program on the administration. While the president had asserted the program is necessary to prevent rising food prices and hold back inflation, congressional foes contend the plan would have an opposite effect.

New Super Planes Soon To Join Allied Forces

WASHINGTON, July 8—(AP)—New super-secret fighter planes designed to meet up-to-the-minute combat conditions have started rolling off the assembly lines to take their place in the stepped up aerial offensive of the allies.

Disclosure that new fighter types are in production was made by Charles E. Wilson, executive vice president of the War Production board, who declined, for security reasons, to reveal any details whatever.

When all present production facilities reach their ultimate maximum, Wilson predicted this country will be able to turn out "in excess of 10,000 planes monthly." This peak will not be reached until some time in 1944. (Plane production in May exceeded 7,000, the highest so far announced.)

Highway Officials to Tour Oregon Systems

PORTLAND, July 8—(AP)—Postwar projects will be considered by Oregon highway commissioners on an inspection tour of the Pacific and Coast highways next week.

The party will leave here Monday and take the coastal area first. The commissioners will meet with officials of the 13 counties touched by the two highways and chamber of commerce representatives in principal cities.

The commission will make no commitments until all possible projects have been studied and congress announces the extent of federal aid, said Highway Engineer Baldoke.

Forest Service Rule of Revested Lands Sought

WASHINGTON, July 8—(AP)—A bill providing for forest service administration of unselected and unpatented odd-number sections of the old Oregon-California revested grant lands has been passed by the senate and sent to the house.

The bill, introduced by Senator McNary, would distribute all revenues from use of the lands according to an act of 1937, which provided a method for reimbursing counties in which the lands are situated for tax revenue losses.

Interior and agriculture departments have clashed for years over the administrative authority.
