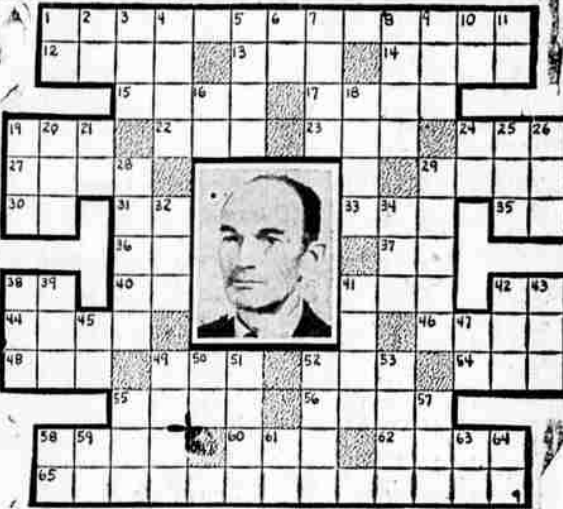

Local Rainfall During June Exceeds Normal

Considerable deviation from normal June weather is reported in the monthly meteorological summary compiled by J. C. McCallister, in charge of the local office of the U. S. weather bureau. Rainfall for the month totaled 2.23 inches, as compared with a normal of 1.09 inches, raising the surplus precipitation since Sept. 1, 1942, to 11 inches. The surplus since Jan. 1, 1943, amounts to 1.17 inches.

Temperature for the month was below normal with an average daily departure of minus 1.3 degrees. The highest temperature recorded was 88 degrees on date of June 16 and the lowest was 45 degrees on the 15th.
