House Inquiry Denied Military Documents

WASHINGTON, July 9 — (AP) — The War and Navy departments refused today, by direction of President Roosevelt, to turn over to a house investigating committee headed by Rep. Cox (D-Ga.) certain documents it had requested to support charges that the Federal Communications commission was interfering with intelligence operations of the armed services.

The department's position was

stated in letters, made public by Chairman Cox and signed by Undersecretary of War Patterson and Acting Secretary of the Navy Forrestal.

Forrestal and Patterson also notified the committee they

would not permit the appearance of army and navy officers the committee desired to question.
