Coos Bay Area Listed In Bonneville Survey

PORTLAND, July 10—(AP)—The Bonneville Power administration announced today completion of an industrial survey of the Coos Bay area, including details of 13 available sites covering 1,975 acres with 11 miles of deep-water frontage.

The survey stresses Coos county's lumbering importance, pointing out that in 1941 it ranked seventh among all U. S. counties and fourth in Oregon in lumber production. Mineral resources, boosted by wartime interest in Coos coal deposits, are discussed in detail.

Bonneville said the survey was made in response to increasing requests for information regarding suitable industrial locations.

Woman Patient In Hospital Kills Herself

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10—(AP)—Mrs. Margaret Lynch Lombard, daughter of a pioneer Yakima physician, committed suicide in her room in a local hospital yesterday by slashing her throat, wrists and arms with a razor blade, Deputy Coroner R. L. Crabtree reported.

She was the daughter of the late Dr. C. J. Lynch, and daughter-in-law of H. H. Lombard, prominent Yakima valley orchardist.

Crabtree said Mrs. Lombard, 36, suffering from a nervous breakdown, inflicted the fatal cuts in the bathroom of her hospital room a few minutes after a nurse had left the room for clean bed linen.

School Supt. Dugdale Of Portland Resigns

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10—(AP)—Ralph E. Dugdale, Portland school superintendent since 1937, resigned last night, and his resignation was immediately accepted by the board.

His contract had 41 years to run but was cancelled by mutual agreement when the board voted him \$10,000—one year's salary.

Several of Mr. Dugdale's changes in the school system aroused sharp criticism. The board hopes to name a successor in a few weeks.

The names of Paul Gaiser, superintendent of schools at Vancouver, Wash., and Frank Bennett, superintendent at Salem, have been mentioned as possibilities by board members.

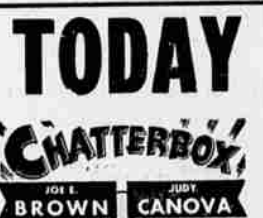

Grow Feed, Warning To Poultry Raisers

Poultry growers should be growing sufficient quantities of carrots, broccoli, kale and other crops to provide feed during coming months, Mrs. H. A. Watzig, recently elected president of the Oregon Baby Chick association, reports. There is every indication, she states, that there will be a severe shortage of poultry feeds, due in part to the fact that alfalfa dehydration plants are being used to provide dehydrated foods for war purposes.

There is still time, Mrs. Watzig points out, to grow and store carrots for winter feed for breeders and layers. Carrots contain large amounts of vitamins and minerals, as well as green feed. For summer use, she states, root crops and greens should be made available.
