I'm giving enough already?

The Aircraft Warning Service is a necessary duty that must be kept going 24 hours a day, every day, until the war is over. That is a lot of time. So that the burden will not be too great on a few, every woman is asked to volunteer a few hours a week. Sign up for the time most convenient to you. Bring your Red Cross work with you. Write letters to your men in uniform while on duty—they'll be proud to know you're ACTIVELY, not just sentimentally, behind them.



I have small children?

They'll never miss you if you take a night shift. Your husband or older children will be at home to care for them in emergency.



I just don't have the time?

This is really the weakest excuse of all because it is almost always an admission that you are incapable or unwilling to organize your time. So many of your activities can be performed at the filter center while waiting for calls. You write letters, don't you? You try to keep up with what people are thinking in this world, don't you? Perhaps you do paper organizational work for your pet club activities? Do you have mending to do? Are you knitting for your service man or for service men? Do you make bandages, baby clothes, etc. for the Red Cross? Simply plan to do these things you do anyway while earning your 500-hour pin in the Aircraft Warning Corps (filter board) or Ground Observer Corps.
