

International Force to Assure Peace Proposed

PORTLAND, July 13—(AP)—Sen. Joseph H. Ball (R-Minn.) and Rep. Albert A. Gore (D-Tenn.) were here yesterday for addresses urging support of an international organization to enforce the coming peace.

Ball told reporters he believed the peace should be an election issue "not only for congress but for anybody who runs for public office." He said the American people should know where every elected servant stands with regard to the peace and the need for "an American, not a republican or a democratic foreign policy."

Public opinion will be more nearly crystallized on the form the peace should take now than in 1919, Ball said. "We have all the experience of the league of nations to draw on—the good and the bad. We can correct the mistakes."

Ball and Gore said labor would insist upon a loud voice in peace plans because labor can survive only in a democracy and democ-

cracy cannot survive in continuing wars.

They said their tour thus far has shown that the public is in favor of collective action to keep the peace. This would be done, they said, by an international police force.

Allies Take Augusta in Rapid Sweep of Sicily

the 206th Italian coastal division, was the first ranking enemy officer to be captured since the invasion of Sicily began last Saturday.

Some German opposition has been met, but not yet in force, and though the allies have now made contact with two regular Italian divisions—presumably of much sterner character than the coastal defenders—the enemy has failed to put up really stiff resistance, allied officers said.

Pilots of allied bombers participating in the furious aerial onslaught against axis targets throughout Sicily reported that the Sicilian straits still were choked with transport and supply ships carrying reinforcements to the British, American and Canadian forces which spearheaded the invasion.

Foe's Supply Link Blasted

Allied headquarters announced that more than 3,000 vessels of all types, including warships, now were taking part in the tremendous task of transporting men, munitions and supplies to Sicily. The work was said to be "proceeding satisfactorily," despite a surf that had made operations difficult at the more exposed positions.

While the allied ground forces moved swiftly toward the heart of Sicily, the invaders' great air fleet continued to paralyze the island's defenses and to obstruct belated efforts by the enemy to rush reinforcements to its key-stone outpost.

Flying Fortresses and Liberators joined yesterday in heavy daylight attacks on Messina and on the twin ferry terminals of Reggio Calabria and San Giovanni on the Italian mainland, while fighters and fighter bombers sustained their assaults on enemy troop columns and communication lines.

RAF torpedo planes were reported to have sunk two large merchant ships and damaged two destroyers and two big troop transports in attacks on convoys attempting to reach Sicily. Attacking pilots said they scored torpedo hits on two transports whose decks were jammed with axis soldiers.

Twenty-eight axis planes were reported to have been destroyed yesterday and the preceding night, against a loss of 11 allied craft in the same period.

Record Harvest In 1944 Asked of Farmers of U. S.

WASHINGTON, July 13—

(AP)—Calling on farmers to mobilize every crop acre and farming facility for a record harvest next year, Marvin Jones, head of the War Food administration announced today the government in 1944 wants 380,000,000 acres of crops planted and meat, dairy and egg production maintained at high levels.

The projected acreage is an increase of 16,000,000 over that planted for 1943 harvest and Jones explained:

"The program recognizes that demands for food will be imperative for several years and that sound practices must be followed to insure highest possible yields over a period of years."

Included in the program, he said, are measures to assist farmers in carrying out conservation practices and in maintaining maximum productivity of their land.

He promised that considerably more machinery and fertilizer would be available for the 1944 crop.

Jones said there was need for more dry beans and peas, soybeans, potatoes and peanuts which have high food value. He said to obtain adequate increases in such crops, the WFA would continue to support prices at levels designed to bring the needed production volume.

A specific goal of 68,000,000 acres of wheat was set for 1944, compared with 54,149,000 acres for harvest this year. Goals for other crops will be announced as soon as this year's yields can be determined.

The total slaughter of meat for the next 12 months, Jones said, probably will run 50 per cent above the average for the 1936-40 period.

KNOX MUM ON RUMOR OF KURILE BASE ATTACK

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—Secretary Knox declined today to affirm or deny that American planes had attacked the Japanese base of Paramushiro, at the northern end of the Kurile island chain.

Such an attack would be a logical follow-up of American advances in the Aleutians area and a logical development of the growing air force strength there.

The big Japanese base, at the northern end of an island chain stretching out north of Japan, is 861 nautical miles due west of the American base on Amchitka island in the Aleutians and only 630 nautical miles southwest of the newly conquered island of Attu. Long range American bombers could hit the base from either of those places, provided base facilities were available.

A navy communique yesterday disclosed that a group of army and navy bombers successfully attacked four Japanese cargo ships 280 miles southwest of Holtz bay, Attu island. This put the attack on a direct line between Amchitka and Paramushiro and almost midway between the two bases.

A Japanese communique broadcast by the Tokyo radio today reported that a flotilla of Japanese destroyers had sunk two American cruisers and set another afire in a battle north of Kolombangara island in the Solomons last night.

One Japanese cruiser was damaged, said the broadcast, which was recorded by the Associated Press.

Accidental Blast Kills 18 Men at Army Air Base

ELGIN FIELD, Fla., July 13—(AP)—Two officers and 15 enlisted men were killed at this army air base yesterday by an accidental explosion, public relations reported today.

Fifty-one others were injured. The extent of their injuries was not disclosed but most were believed to have escaped with minor hurts.

Capt. William W. Lange, public relations officer, said cause of the accident had not been determined, but disclosed that the men were clearing stumps at the time of the blast.

U. S. to Revoke Parole Of Man Accused Here

Douglas county will not be required to extradite J. D. Smith, charged here with issuance of worthless checks, now in custody at Fort Wayne, Ind., Sheriff Bud Carter reported today. The sheriff was advised last night that the federal government has taken over the case, apparently with the purpose of revoking parole from a five-year sentence, the sheriff said. Smith was wanted here for passing a number of checks, totalling about \$100, last November.

3,000 Interned Japs Ask for Repatriation

DENVER, July 13—(AP)—Robert Frase, assistant chief of the War Relocation authority employment division at Washington, said yesterday that segregation of persons of Japanese descent who have applied for repatriation papers will begin about Sept. 1.

Frase said that 3,000 of the residents of the relocation cen-

ters who have expressed a desire to return to Japan will be sent to one of the 10 relocation camps in the country "as soon as the railroads can provide transportation."

Copper Wire Is Made Available to Farmers

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—The War Food administration announced yesterday that, in a few and simplified arrangement, farmers wanting copper wire for necessary farm improvements may apply to their county war boards for certificates. On the grant of one of these certificates, a farmer then may present it to a local supplier.

Warm weather thirst quenchers

When that old, red mercury starts climbing toward the top of the thermometer, be ready with thirst quenchers that will buoy up your spirit! Simple to plan, simpler to make. Casual coolers... special occasion beverages... nourishing milk drinks that serve as part of a meal—any one of them will prove to be a welcome pickup when energy seems to be at low ebb. SUGAR SYRUPS—One of the first requisites of cool beverages is the sweetening that can be added instantly. It stretches the sugar supply, too, because it blends with the drink completely. Have some on hand. Combine 1 cup sugar with 2 cups water, stir until dissolved, then boil rapidly for 10 minutes. Cool and store covered in the refrigerator until needed.

FRUIT ADES—Oranges, lemons and grapefruit are tops among thirst quenchers. But don't forget other fresh fruit, too. Press the juice from ripe plums, peaches, apricots, nectarines or berries by forcing the fruits through a food press or coarse sieve. Mix the juice with water... or for that added sparkle, mix it with plain carbonated water. Add sugar syrup to taste, and serve frosty cold.

MILK SHAKES—HOME STYLE—When a light snack is in order, serve it in the form of a nourishing milk drink. Mix chilled milk with sugar syrup and flavoring, or with molasses, honey or corn syrup. A dash of plain carbonated water will give it that "ice cream soda fizz," and a bit of nutmeg dashed on top will add just enough spice.

FRUIT SYRUPS—Don't forget to save all the syrups from canned fruits. They are grand mixed with lemon or orange-ade or for that fruity flavor in milk drinks.

TOMATO LEMON PUNCH—Fresh tomato juice, pressed from ripe tomatoes and enlivened with a bit of lemon juice makes one of the most ideal thirst quenchers for the hottest days. Add just a bit of sugar syrup, a dash of clove and stretch with carbonated water. Serve cold as ice. It's something to rave about.
