## Dollar Placed Over Patriotism, Priest Declares

MT. ANGEL, Ore., July 14—(AP)—The Rev. Alcuin Heibel, Mt. Angel priest who leaves next week for Mexico, warned in a service club address here yesterday that the spiritual aspect of the war effort needs more emphasis.

Unless this is done, he declared, "there is a time coming when the dollar sign will be more dangerous than the Swastika."

"We are fighting this war so that the God-given rights of men may be had wherever men want to be men; and how can we attain this end if we are working only for self gain?"

Father Alcuin said that most war workers are working only for the money they get out of it, instead of for patriotic reasons. He deplored high wages paid to children as demoralizing, and said the real heroes of the war are the white collar people.

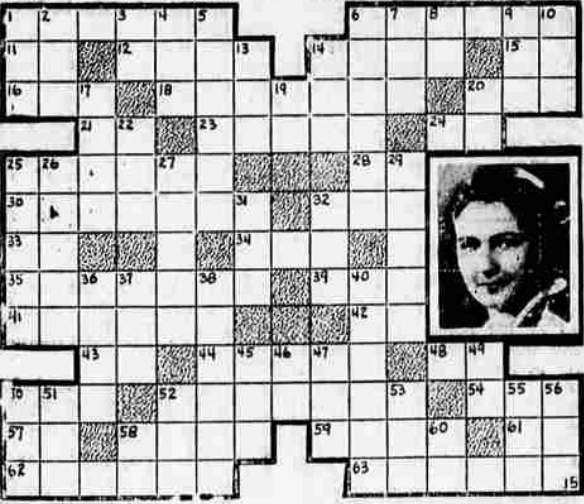

## American Soldiers Based in India Encounter Strong Native "Gimme" Habit, According to Tommy Atkins

The life of an American soldier in India is interestingly told in a letter received by the News-Review from Lewis P. (Tommy) Atkins, who formerly operated the Handy stand in Roseburg, and whose wife is employed here at Fisher's store. Telling of experiences in India, Atkins says:

"Living conditions in the place where we are stationed, are not bad except for the extreme hot weather. Our barracks are quite comfortable, and the food is pretty good, too. We have Indian boys, (some really boys, and others with white hair and whiskers,) who are on duty in the barracks from the time we get up in the morning till about six in the evening, and they do just about everything for us—make beds, shine shoes, keep water jugs filled, sew on buttons, mend socks, and just about anything that we require. Bearers, they are called, and there is one for approximately every fifteen men. Each man pays the bearer about four rupees per month, (a rupee, in United States money is worth about thirty-four cents). There are overhead fans which are run twenty-four hours a day. Working conditions, too, are very good. As my work is of a more or less secret nature, I am in a room without windows, and we have air conditioning. We work eight hours and are then free for twenty-four.

When we get away from the area of our own installation, however, things are vastly different in many respects. For one thing, transportation is not the same. Bikes are used extensively by the Americans, the British, and the educated Indians. If you don't have the use of a bike, though, and want to get around, you get a tonga, a two-wheeled horse-drawn affair. There are two double seats back to back, so that passengers in the front seat have a front view, and vice versa. Once in a great while you get into one that is fairly new, but most of them seem to have been in service from ancient times, and usually the horse is a plug. The drivers refer to Americans as 'Rajah,' (a rich man), and the rates they try to get from us would indicate that they really believe it. For an average trip we pay them eight annas (a half rupee), and let it go at that. They always want a rupee or two, and come after us crying, 'sahib, sahib,' (meaning mister or master, the term used by natives when addressing Europeans or Americans). The word is pronounced like 'sah,' and they do get the sob into their voices. Sometimes we pay them off in stamps, (used for small change because of a coin shortage), and they don't like that either. The tongas, in some parts of India, is drawn by natives, as the jinricksha in China, and in other parts of the East. Most local hauling is done by bullock carts or on the backs of camels or donkeys, all very slow of course, but they seem to never stop and there are so many of them that the job always seems to get done.

"Where the Americans really

get taken in is by the shopkeepers. Naturally, many of the boys are interested in buying souvenirs and gifts to be sent home, and it is here that the rub comes in. Prices have been going higher and higher since the Americans arrived. One shopkeeper put it to me in this way: 'The Americans are here and they don't mind paying.' In most shops there are three different prices; for natives, for British, and for Americans. A few days ago I paid ten rupees for two rolls of number six sixteen kodak film, and three rupees and eight annas for a fifty-cent tube of Pepsodent tooth paste. There is one place, though, where we get off much better, and that is the barber shop. We have one of the installation and here we do get service for a song. A haircut costs four annas, and for two annas each we can get a shave, a scalp or facial massage or a shampoo. We pay five rupees per month for laundry service, and can send it out three times a week with a two-day service. This is done completely by hand, and the natives who do it are called dobbies.

"I do not believe that the American soldiers are interested in learning more of the native language than is necessary, and that is very little. The British have been in India so long that most of the natives know enough English that we can easily make ourselves understood. There is one word, however, that they learned quickly, and is used frequently. That is 'jao!' and means go or scam. It is used to scare away the beggars, of which there are a great number, at any place one goes, in India. They come at you from all angles, crying 'bawkshees, sahib, bawkshees.'

"For spending our spare time, there are various places to go and things to do. We have, nearby, a very nice service club, operated by the American Red Cross, which is, of course a popular place. In some places there are theaters, but where they are not available to the soldiers, the army shows movies once a week. Patients in the hospitals always see a show a week furnished by the army, as they are not able to go out to the theaters. There are a couple of swimming pools near here that soldiers are allowed to use, and a lot of them take advantage of it. The army furnishes the equipment for almost any outdoor sport one could mention or wish for, most of this is

## All-Out Listing For War Service May Eventuate

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—New draft legislation, including a proposal to require all adult men and women to register for service in the war effort, will be the subject of extensive hearings by the house military committee when the congressional recess ends in September.

By that time, Chairman May said today, the committee hopes to have available more data bearing on the prospect of inducing fathers.

"Whether we shall expedite legislation, already passed by the senate, to boost the government payments to dependents of drafted men will depend in a large measure on the outlook two months from now," May said.

May said he shared a general belief among committee members that the induction of fathers would be put off for some time, perhaps indefinitely. In that event, he explained, the need for boosting federal payments already provided would be lessened.

However, he added, should the

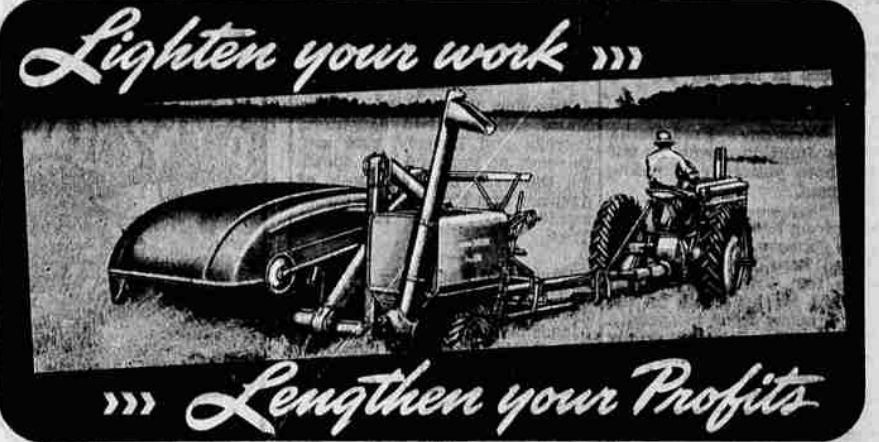
