Milk Situation in Central Oregon Slated for Probe

PORTLAND, July 15.—(AP)—Richard G. Montgomery, director, announced today the OPA would start two investigations Friday into the milk situation at The Dalles and throughout central Oregon.

In response to a request by the Bend city council and chamber of commerce, R. Harold Frampton of the OPA accounting division, will make a study on the cost of milk production around Bend.

Maure Goldschmidt, price specialist, and J. N. Chambers, senior price officer, will attend a public meeting called by Mayor George Stadelman at The Dalles Friday afternoon.

OPA recently set milk prices on a uniform basis in the areas along the east side of the Cascades at 85 cents a pound wholesale.

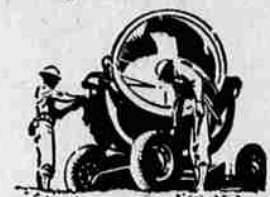
Milk producers in Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook counties contended that these figures are below cost of production and signed an agreement not to deliver fluid milk after August 1, unless OPA increases the ceiling to \$1 for "A" grade and 95 cents for "C" grade.

At The Dalles one producer, distributor has gone out of business since the prices were set and another, the largest distributor in the city, threatens to close up.

More Nitrates to Be Available but In Unusual Form

Farmers of Oregon and other parts of the country as well as are going to profit by the ability of the makers of synthetic nitrogen to provide more nitrates than are required by the munitions industry, reports Art King, extension specialist in soils at Oregon State college.

At the same time they are going to have to get used to using an unfamiliar form of nitrogen because the surplus from the munitions industry comes in the form of ammonium nitrate instead of the familiar ammonium sulphate or sodium nitrate. Ammonium nitrate comes in the strength of about 32 to 35 per cent nitrogen but it has the characteristic of absorbing water from the air whenever exposed. It also may not be mixed with organic material because in such form it is highly explosive, King explains.

Indications now are that the supplies of nitrogen fertilizer for next year will be 25 per cent more than last year, which means they will be the greatest in history. Because of this prospect there is likelihood of relaxation of the present rigid requirements restricting chemical nitrogen to certain crops.

While this ammonium nitrate may not be in the hands of the retail dealers yet, an abundant supply is available and can be obtained by dealers.

King is now working on a device for applying this material easily in the form of a liquid top dressing to crops or to unseeded fields. He says it is also an ideal fertilizer to apply through sprinkler irrigation equipment. Part of it is in the nitrate form and penetrates with the irrigation water. The remainder, in the ammonium form, stays near the surface.

Field trials of this new form of nitrogen fertilizer have been established in several counties. Further information on the possibilities of this material may be obtained from any county agent.

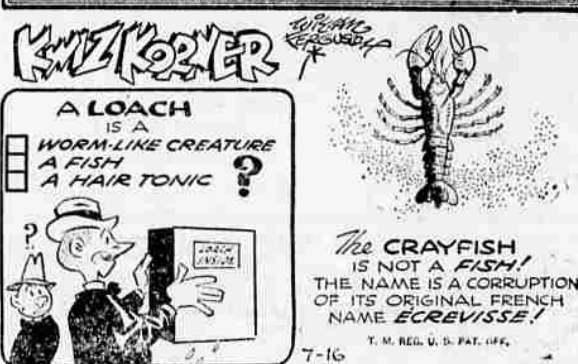

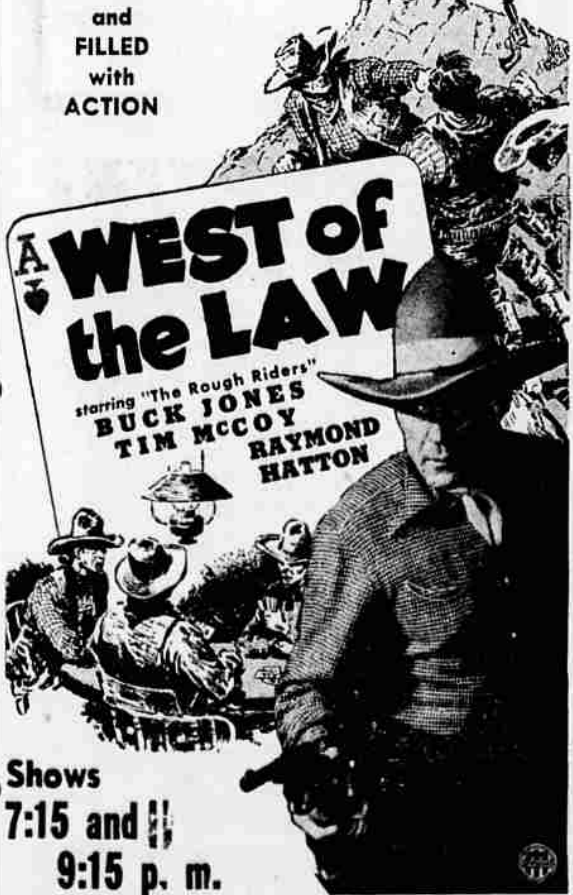
