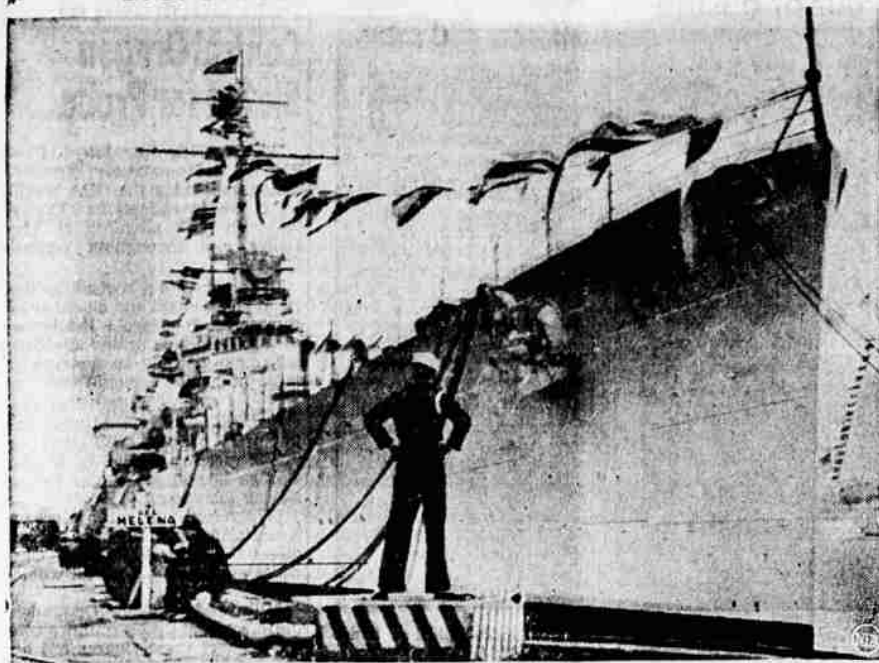

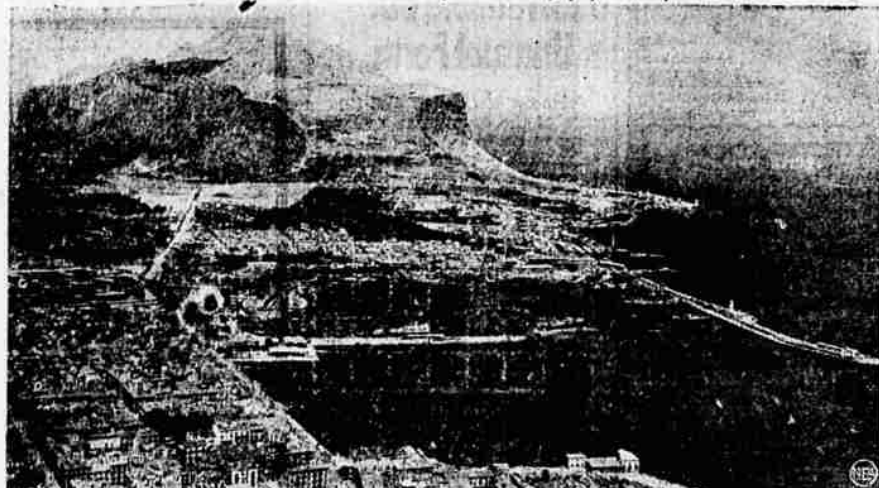

Axis Leaders Get Horse Laugh At Spokane Jokefest

SPOKANE, July 15—(AP)—Who said—no coaching, please—"We take Russia in three weeks?" The Spokane athletic round table, which is dedicated to laughing itself dizzy at its own jokes and usually has the world laughing with it, started another of its snowballing chuckles today at the expense of the axis.

With State Senator Virgil Warren wielding the pen, a group of pictures quoting famous and unfulfilled predictions of axis leaders were prepared for mailing to the membership and for display locally on billboards.

A typical example: "Mussolini said: 'We will parade in Alexandria next Monday.'" It Duce himself, chest and chin out, is pictured, but in the background his soldiers are walking with upraised hands and white flags, and a corner, Esmeralda, the round table's horse mascot, laughs toothily.

Others show Hitler attempting to outrun allied bullets; Goering, out at the elbows, predicting bombs could not fall on Germany even as bombs rain about his ears; Yamamoto reclining in his casket, unable to dictate peace in the White House. In each case, Esmeralda supplies laughter.

The A. R. T. committee handling the project said it would suggest that business men the nation over adopt the idea for their advertising, to "keep the axis on the run."

Although the project came on the heels of War Production Board Chief Donald M. Nelson's request that American business help break a production slump through its advertising, the round table said it had no hint that Nelson would make such a plea.

Mrs. J. B. Byrne Funeral To Be Held at Oakland

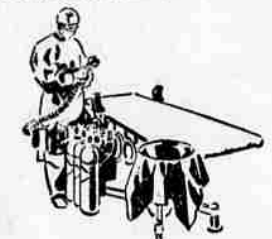

TOUGH HOMBRE

CAMP STEWART, Ga.—His commanding officer thought Pvt. Andrew J. Capariso was too frail for anything but limited service in the army, but changed his mind when he learned that:

In the past four years Capariso, a former member of the Greek merchant marine, has been on three torpedoeships, twice tossed adrift in the Atlantic, once for 16 days in an open boat in which three men died, again when he used the body of a dead man as a raft for three days; he was interned in North Africa for 15 months, underwent air raids in England and was wounded in the hand by shrapnel at Dakar.

A native of Pensacola, Fla., he weighed 165 when the war started, lost 65 pounds, is back up to 135.

National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to and not later than 10:00 A. M. August 14, 1943, for all the live and dead timber designated for cutting located on an area embracing about 110 acres within Lots 3, 4 and 5 and SE1 SW1, Section 6, T. 29 S., R. 2 W., W. M., South Myrtle Creek watershed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 700,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 50,000 feet B. M., more or less, of sugar pine, and 87,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Western hemlock, white fir, Western redcedar, and California incense cedar. No bid of less than \$2.80 per M feet of Douglas-fir, \$5.80 per M feet for sugar pine, and \$8.00 per M feet for all other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$25 per M feet B. M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash and snag disposal, and cooperative deposit of \$30 per M feet B. M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and forest improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$500.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Before final award, the high bidder will be required to make a satisfactory showing of financial ability to carry out the agreement.
