# FOREST PRESERVATION

EDITORIAL.

WE had an opportunity this week to view the destruction which careless logging operations can cause to scenic and recreational resources. Smith Springs, once one of the most beautiful picnic spots along the North Umpqua river, today is a hideous mess of down timber, brush, torn and mangled shrubbery and scarred earth. No attempt was made to preserve the beauty of the spot. In fact, it would appear that the operators went out of their way to destroy as much of the recreational facilities of the location as possible. The river bank and roadway offer a picture of desolation and desecration.

We must anticipate the loss of much of the scenic and recreational resource of the county as logging and lumbering are expanded. We cannot enjoy the benefits of the logging indusry without suffering the destruction of forests.

There are many places, however, where, with a minimum of care, scenery and recreation can be preserved. Through purchase, exchange, and even by talks with operators, strips bordering streams and highways can be left comparatively untouched. Efforts should be made by proper authorities to see that cutover lands, particularly those adjacent to recreational areas, are left clean and not strewn with a tangled mass of logs, brush, broken mchinery, frayed cables, grease drums, etc. These scars can and should be removed and the land left in usable

A man whom we will not name, but who has a first-hand knowledge of conditions connected with the lumber industry has offered a suggestion which we believe to be a good one and upon which action should be secured at the earliest possible

He urges that the county court employ a qualified man as ounty forester. This employee should be a practical manone who understands the technical details of road building lumbering, and forestry. It would be his duty to cooperate with logging concerns, helping them with problems of road location, maintaining routes for hauling logs, and coordinating the ounty's road program with the needs of the logging industry. At the same time he would endeavor to protect the county's interest in scenic and recreational areas, forestall damage to coun ty roads and bridges and otherwise safeguard the public interest.

The employee need not necessarily be a graduate engineer. In fact, a practical man with a background of woods experience would be the type of representative most acceptable. At the same time he should be a person who is thoroughly versed in the logging technique, so that he would help, rather than hinder, the industrial program.

As the industry expands in Douglas county, such a representative, devoting his full time to the task of maintaining liaison between the county court and the various logging operations

could be of great value to both the county and the operators. We believe the suggestion is worthy of most careful consider-

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
