AAF Officers Warn West Coast Not Yet Safe

Army Air Force officials expressed alarm today at civilian indifference toward the threat of enemy attack in this area. They attributed the widespread feeling that defense precautions here are unnecessary to a "false sense of security" induced by recent South Pacific victories.

"The truth of the matter is that the danger of attack on the West Coast becomes greater as our victories grow greater," the officers were told.

Reporters were cited the splendid work now being done by volunteers in the aircraft warning corps and ground observer corps, but said there was still an urgent need for more workers.
