Housing Shortage Of Lower Umpqua Recited

REEDSPORT, Ore., July 17—(AP)—Three lumber companies told federal housing representatives yesterday that they were in danger of losing key men because of the housing shortage in this district. Attending a conference of housing were F. A. Cuthbert, senior housing representative, Portland, and D. T. Yoder of the Seattle office of the Federal Housing Service.

Rationing board representatives told the visitors they had supplied additional gasoline to many mill workers forced to live long distances from their work.

The Gardiner Lumber company said it wanted to build at least 12 additional houses. The Bridge Lumber company said 24 employees were in need of housing and the E. F. Wood company said 10 of their key men needed housing.

Defense Incident Test Here is Successful

The civilian defense incident test in Roseburg last night proved very successful, Richard Maddox, commander, reported today. The problem involved a simulated bomb hit on the Masonic building, resulting in a "casualty." With fire escapes and stairways blocked, the fire department removed a dummy body from the roof of the building, after scaling the walls with ladders, while air raid wardens, first aid units and ambulance unit all participated. The practice was preceded by a test of the air raid alarm equipment.

Federal Gift Tax Out for Oregon

PORTLAND, July 17—(AP)—Oregon citizens who avail themselves of the state's new community property law will not be subject to a federal gift tax, State Senator Lew Wallace has informed F. H. Young from Washington. Young is manager of Oregon Business & Tax Research Inc. Wallace said he got his information from the federal bureau of internal revenue.

The community property law was designed by the last legislature to lift some of the federal income tax load from Oregon taxpayers. It makes possible a community property basis for man and wife so that each may file separate returns.

Even though the income of the husband may constitute the entire family income, for purposes of taxation under the new law it can be considered as partnership income, with the husband and wife each reporting half of it.

It has been estimated that the law would save Oregon's more

affluent taxpayers a total of \$9,000,000 a year in federal taxes.

Roy Sorenson, Former Roseburg Resident, Dies

Word has been received here of the death, July 11, of Roy Sorenson, 46, former resident of Roseburg, at South Gate, California hospital. A native of Omaha, Neb., he moved to South Gate a year ago after residing in Roseburg for a number of years.
