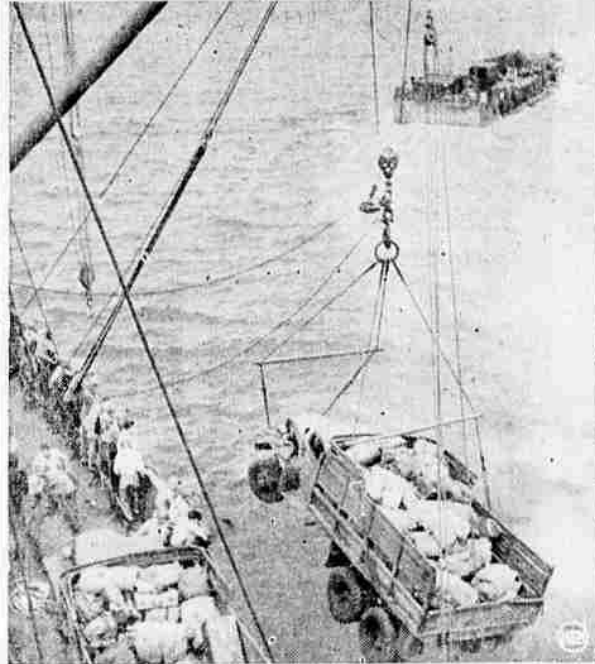

Oregon Finds Favor With Mexican Workers

PENDLETON, Ore., July 19—(AP)—Mexicans, imported as farm laborers by the Farm Security administration, like this country—the chance to earn up to \$70 weekly and have stores open at their convenience.

The high wages so far have come principally in cherry picking, in which one man earned \$73 one week.

Since few speak English they didn't find out about the stores for some time. Then one night 315 of them got an interpreter and came to town after stores had closed. Merchants reopened on request—and did a landoffice business in overalls, shirts, shoes and underwear.

Coast Business Set to Air War by Advertising

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—When the heads of various administrative departments in Washington decided on appeal to the businessmen of the nation for increased war advertising through a national broadcast, they found the Pacific coast organized and waiting for the signal. The Pacific Advertising association, with its twenty-three clubs scattered through the coast states, had already set up Victory Advertising committees to carry out such a project. These committees will assist the government in getting advertisers to use one-third of their advertising space for war messages.

Government agencies are looking to advertising to solve many of the difficulties involved in civilian food supply; to promote those activities that will curb the tendency toward inflation; to secure support for the Red Cross, the blood bank, the services of women in the WACS, the WAVES, and in private industry; and, in general to keep the home front functioning smoothly in every way.

John E. Borkman Dies Here at the Age of 80

John E. Borkman, 80, a native of Finland, died at his home in Roseburg today. Born in Helsinki, Finland, he came to the United States 56 years ago, and was engaged as a canneryman throughout his active life. He had made his home in Oregon for the past 15 years.

Surviving are three daughters: Mrs. Charles A. Lee, Riversdale; Mrs. Thelma Grobes, Los Angeles, and Mrs. Edith Sadler, Glendale, Calif., and a son, Ted B. Borkman, now in military service.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors, and will be taken to Salem, where funeral services will be held at Hillcrest cemetery at 1 p. m. Thursday.

Six Fugitives Sought By Oregon State Police
